ABOUT WEBB SQUARED

WEBB Squared is a 501(c)(3) EIN 86-3751750. Our program provides a supportive ecosystem around BIPOC entrepreneurs living in Chatham County of North Carolina.

WEBB's Mission: to redress the racial wealth gap and build generational wealth by providing incubator-accelerator services to Black and Brown entrepreneurs.

WEBB's Vision: An economy that is just, fair and free from race-constructed barriers in which every person, family, and community has the chance to build sustainable wealth and well-being.

WEBB's Core Services for Entrepreneurs include:

- One-on-One Mentoring and Coaching
- Connection to Technical Assistance and other Service Providers
- Culturally Currated Entrepreneurial Workshops and Trainings
- Access to Networks and Resources

BACKGROUND



In 2022, Chatham County undertook the "Minority Entrepreneur and Small Business Needs Assessment," uncovering significant support gaps for minority entrepreneurs despite the county's growth potential.

The report highlighted entrenched:

- disparities in income,
- wealth gaps
- opportunity gaps,
- lack of trust among historically marginalized entrepreneurs and the broader business community
- an urgent need for an inclusive entrepreneurial ecosystem

In fiscal year 2023-24, Chatham County contracted WEBB
Squared to work collaboratively with the County and a group of
partners committed to achieving equitable economic
development to build the "inclusive and equitable entrepreneurial
and small business ecosystem" recommended by the Needs
Assessment Report.

WEBB Squared named this program the "BIPOC Business Hub," creating a supportive ecosystem for marginalized entrepreneurs.

DEMOGRAPHICS 2022-2023

- Total Entrepreneurs we have enrolled in our program since inception: 43
- Active entrepreneurs receiving coaching services right now: 20
- Active Recuriting: 10

OUTCOMES 2022-2023

43 entrepreneurs enrolled in program 20 active receiving weekly coaching in 2023 **20 from Chatham County**

- 50% moved from ideation to production stages of their businesses
- 23% Completed license and registration
- 23% Written business plans
- WEBB conducted 423+ hours of 1x1 Coaching sessions with entrepreneurs
- WEBB contracted with 7 BIPOC entrepreneurs to provide organization goods and services for various programs and events.
- WEBB conducted 17 Workshops and roundtable discussions in Chatham County in outreach to BIPOC Entrepreneurs reaching 50+ people

- Identified organizations to provide technical assistance for minority entrepreneurs to become HUB Certified
- Provided Technical assistance to entrepreneurs to develop capabilities statements

- Participated in CCCC vendor supply chain and info recruitment summit
- Identified NC Growth to provide technical assistance for minority entrepreneurs to become HUB Certified

WEBB Squared's Impact - Operationalizing Inclusive Economic Development in Chatham County

The BIPOC Business Hub has impacted Chatham County by significantly boosting support and opportunities for BIPOC entrepreneurs. Through strategic collaborations with key partners such as 79 West Innovation HUB, Chatham EDC, CCCC-SBC, NC Growth, Chatham Literacy, the Chamber of Commerce, and Thread Capital, the Hub has become a vital resource for our community. Here are the key accomplishments:

- Community Engagement and Insights: Organized nine roundtable discussions with Black and Latino communities, providing crucial insights for fostering collaboration and "State of Black Entrepreneurship" data report.
- Direct Support to Entrepreneurs: Developed relationships with BIPOC entrepreneurs and community organizations in West Chatham. Connected entrepreneurs to begin financial relationships with CDFI Thread Capital, offering them essential coaching and capital resources.
- Financial Literacy and Business Skills: Integrated Chatham Literacy programming into the WEBB Squared initiative, leading four WEBB entrepreneurs to join Chatham Literacy's financial program, enhancing their business skills.
- Program Enrollment and Resource Access: Enrolled two businesses in the Sparks program through CCCC Small Business Center, ensuring they received comprehensive support.

Our tracking mechanisms and coordinated logistics, a testament to the strength of our partnerships, have ensured the smooth delivery of services through both in-person and hybrid meetings, enhancing accessibility and effectiveness.

The Result: The BIPOC Business Hub has successfully widened access to resources, support, and opportunities, empowering BIPOC entrepreneurs to thrive. This not only fosters individual business success but also contributes significantly to the economic growth and diversity of Chatham County.

FY 2024-2025....OUTREACH AND COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT....WEBB WILL

CONTINUE:

- Identifing, aligning, and collaborating on programs entrepreneurs of color can access to connect them to knowledge, services, networking, and other assets to help launch, grow, and sustain their businesses
- Sharing presentations about WEBB Squared programs for rural community partners, including libraries, churches, and community centers throughout Chatham County
- Working with CCCC Small Business Center and Chatham County to identify opportunities for BIPOC businesses in government-sponsored programs

NEW THIS YEAR:

- Develop a schedule of events, workshops, seminars, etc., for BIPOC entrepreneurs
- Work collaboratively with ecosystem partners to share WEBB Squared programming and Equity in Economic workshops
- Identify appropriate resources, events, and networking opportunities for BIPOCentrepreneurship
- Coordinate workshops across Chatham County to assess BIPOC entrepreneurs' needs and share information about Business Hub partners' services and relative events
- Provide opportunities for co-working spaces, conference spaces, and small business center
- Networking in Pittsboro to expand to Chatham's rural areas

FY 2024-2025...DEVELOPING ACCESS TO RESOURCES, NETWORKS AND RELATIONSHIP BUILDING...WEBB WILL

CONTINUE:

- Conducting one-on-one relational meetings with BIPOC Business Hub ecosystem partners and new, potential eco-system partners to deepen relationships and integrate programs
- Convening industry stakeholder organizations, BIPOC Business Hub partners, and Chatham County leaders at quarterly meetings
- Solidifying programmatic commitments from the industry-diverse BIPOC Business Hub ecosystem of partners

NEW THIS YEAR:

- Recruit and partner with professionals offering pro-bono services for business owners
- Research and compile a vetted list of equitable financing opportunities for BIPOC entrepreneurs
- Identify links to state-level resources and CDFIs serving the state of NC for minority entrepreneurs
- Work collaboratively with the Chatham EDC, Chatham Chamber of Commerce, and Chatham professional associations to promote BIPOC businesses and facilitate networking opportunities
- Secure technical assistance for HUB Certification

FY 2024-2025....CAPACITY BUILDING AND TRAINING, DATABASE AND INFORMATION MANAGEMENT....WEBB WILL

NEW THIS YEAR:

- Access contracting and procurement forecasts to provide insights for minority entrepreneurs
- Facilitate BIPOC business access to private-sector supply chains and contracts
- Provide connections to technical assistance for WEBB entrepreneurs to meet vendor supply chains' RFP criteria successfully
- Maintain a vetted list of financial pro bono services and financial institutions
- Develop a list of minority owned businesses throughout the county to share with partners
