
Chatham County Board of Commissioners October 20, 2025



Background

In FY 24, funds were budgeted in the utility fund for the demolition of two (2) decommissioned county-owned water tanks:

- Bynum Hill Rd. (standpipe)
- Jack Bennett Rd. (elevated tank)





Winter 2024

 Request for bids for demolition of the water tower requested from interested firms

January 2024-March 2024

- Request from community members to paint rather than demolish water tank
- Alternate bids are received for painting
- ✓ Cost differential minimal between demolition v. paint
- ✓ Decision was to paint water tank
- ✓ Work to commence week of May 20, 2024



<u>May 2024</u>

- Work begins to grind surface of tank to prep for painting
- Calls received into County offices regarding grinding discharge off the tank

May 2024-June 2024

- Site work halted
- Round 1 of soil testing done—initial results indicated elevated levels of chromium 6 and lead around tank
- Bynum Community Garden closed
- NCDEQ consulting on next steps

Additional testing recommended

July 2024

- Pyramid Environmental retained to conduct more extensive grid soil sampling
- Initial Site Sampling (ISS) plan submitted to NCDEQ for approval

September 2024

- Pyramid Environmental grid sampling commences
- Results to NCDEQ for review and determination

October 2024

 Chatham County agrees to transfer water utility function to TriRiver

Late February 2025

No Further Action letter issued by DEQ



March 2025

Community meeting held at CCACC to review results with the community

April-May 2025

New bids received for options to demolish or paint the water tank

July 2025

Administrative decision by county to demolish tank

September 2025

 Following voiced concerns from the community, community input meeting is held at Bynum General Store



The Numbers

Considerations

- Low bidders on both demolition and painting are holding their bids
- Decision and action timeline directly impact community garden
- Painting vs. demolition has inherent long-term costs for the county
