COVID-19 Update

- Over 6 months since the initial case
- Number of confirmed cases and number of deaths:
 - Chatham County 1,577 confirmed cases and 57 deaths (as of 9/15/20)
 - North Carolina 186,887+ confirmed cases and 3,111 deaths
- Percentage of tests coming back positive:
 - Chatham County 3.9% (as of 9/15/20)
 - North Carolina 5.0%
- Community action key to reducing spread
 - Follow the 3 W's: Wear, Wash, Wait!
- Symptoms can be mild.


Daily Lab-Confirmed Cases



COVID-19 Update: Public Health Response

- Weekly meetings with EM and local agencies, long-term care facilities, restaurants, and childcare centers
- Frequent consultation or routine zoom meetings with businesses, Schools, organizations, and public, including through Info Line (phone and email)
- Community outreach and education: Latinx COVID Outreach Team, www.chathamnc.org/coronavirus
- Starting to plan for COVID19 Vaccination Clinics with community partners
- Working with community partners to establish COVID testing sites
- Released messaging about the importance of getting flu shot during a pandemic
- Team effort!





Internal Coronavirus Relief Fund Use

- Public Health & Medical Expenses (\$175,000):
 - Began setting up protective barriers (plexiglass) in offices
 - Purchasing items in conjunction with Emergency Management
 - Exploring support for testing operations with Piedmont Health
- Payroll Expenses (\$1,285,221.12):
 - Identified key staff salaries that will be covered by CRF
- Compliance Expenses (\$300,000):
 - Conducting a needs assessment to determine teleworking accommodations which include monitors, printers, and other devices
 - Purchasing Zoom and GoToMeeting packages to support virtual meetings
- Exploring other projects to determine how we can safely support the Chatham community

External Coronavirus Relief Fund Use

- Nonprofits (\$200,000):
 - Granted \$33,638.91 to eight Chatham County nonprofits in Round 1
 - Launched Round 2 and applications were due on September 15th
 - Evaluating applications to award remaining CRF nonprofit allocation
- Municipalities (\$726,740):
 - Submitted each municipal plan to the State
 - Processed payments to each municipality
- Economic Support (\$195,000):
 - Exploring options with EDC
 - Launched housing support programs through DSS for individuals impacted by COVID-19, which includes utility and mortgage support
- Exploring other ideas to support the greater Chatham community

 Reading and Feeding: Chatham County Public Libraries Staff Step up to Add Good Books with Good Food



- Chatham County Public Libraries employees assembled 500 bags supporting the Libraries' Summer Reading Program. The bags were distributed in conjunction with the Inter-faith Food Shuttle's Mobile Feeding Market on June 4, 2020, at Saint Julia's Catholic Church in Siler City.
- The bags included free books, Summer Reading Program information, a paper craft and 2020 Census materials. The books distributed were originally intended for the Day of the Book Festival in April, which was canceled due to COVID-19. Chatham County Agriculture and Conference Center Assists Emergency Management in COVID-19 Preparedness and Response
