Defining Immediate Next StepsRoles, Responsibilities, and Timeline

November 20 – Climate Advisory Committee reviews outputs of retreat, inventory existing work by the county related to climate, and identify recommended sectors based on other county plans and priorities. This will be used to outline a proposed scope of focus for the county's RFP for a Climate Action Plan.

December 15 – Central Pines present to County Commissioners on the retreat, discussion, and next steps.

January 2026 – The Climate Advisory Committee will present an updated inventory and recommended RFP scope to the Board.

Winter 2026 – County Commissioners Budget Retreat to consider RFP and Climate Action Plan funding
