Introduction & Background: The Chatham County Board of Commissioners has identified affordable housing as a high priority. As a result, staff has utilized the land conveyance process for affordable housing to convey two surplus parcels of land in Moncure (parcels 61967 and 61968) to Habitat for Humanity for the purpose of constructing affordable housing. The land conveyance process is in accord with G.S. 153A-378, which authorizes counties to convey real properties by private sale to entities that provide affordable housing to low or moderate income persons.

Resolution of the Chatham County Board of Commissioners

RESOLUTION DECLARING PROPERTY SURPLUS AND AUTHORIZING THECONVEYANCEOF PROPERTY TO CHATHAM HABITAT FOR HUMANITY

WHEREAS, on August 13, 2010, the County was the highest and final bidder on two (2) parcels of foreclosed property being identified in Chatham County tax records as Parcel Numbers 61967 and 61968 (the "Property"); and

WHEREAS, the County no longer needs the aforementioned Property; and

WHEREAS, by authority of North Carolina General Statute 153A-378, and other relevant law, counties are authorized to convey real property by private sale to entities that provide affordable housing to persons of low or moderate income; and

WHEREAS, the Property shall be used by Habitat for Humanity solely for the purpose of providing affordable housing to residents of Chatham County who are persons of low or moderate income. For purposes of this resolution "affordable housing" shall mean housing available for occupancy or ownership by persons of low or moderate income at mortgage or rental payments not exceeding thirty percent (30%) of the base, unadjusted income of such persons; and "persons of low or moderate income" shall mean persons or households whose annual gross income does not exceed sixty percent (60%) of Area Median Income for Chatham County; and

WHEREAS, covenants containing the foregoing restrictions shall be placed in the deed conveying the Property to Habitat for Humanity requiring that the Property shall continue to be used for affordable housing; and

WHEREAS, originally, this item was to be on the consent agenda; however, the County has been notified that at least one other party has expressed an interest in purchasing the Property; and

WHEREAS, in order to meet the County's goal of creating more affordable housing, the County has determined that the Property should be conveyed to Habitat for Humanity; and

WHEREAS, the County Clerk shall publish notice of this conveyance as required by the NCGS §160A-279 and the conveyance shall not be concluded until at least 10 days after the publication of the notice;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Commissioners of the County of Chatham:

Section 1: The foregoing recitals are adopted as part of this resolution;

Section 2: The Board declares the Property surplus;

Section 2: The Board hereby authorized the conveyance of the Property to Chatham Habitat for Humanity by private sale;

Section 3: The County Manager is authorized to execute a Deed conveying the Property to Habitat for Humanity containing the affordable housing covenants required by this resolution.

Introduction & Background:

The State Transportation Improvement Program (STIP) is the NCDOT's 10 year plan used to identify the construction funding and scheduling for transportation projects at the state level over a 10-year period and is continually updated every 2-3 years. The purpose of this endorsement is for the Board of Commissioners to approve a list of projects to be considered for submittal through the regional planning organizations to the State Prioritization Office of Transportation (SPOT) to be scored in the late summer/early fall.

Discussion & Analysis:

TARPO and the DCHC MPO is requesting local jurisdictions to have their respective Boards endorse the draft project submittal lists. Staff reviewed the list of past projects and scores. Staff also collaborated with the other Regional Planning members and NCDOT as well as all Chatham municipalities to review transportation needs throughout Chatham County (Siler City, Pittsboro, Goldston, and Cary).

The TAC received and reviewed the list of potential transportation needs to be considered on April 25th 2017 and had comment regarding their ranking of priority.

The Chatham County Transportation Advisory Committee (TAC) unanimously approved the needs list (Attachment A).

This list of transportation needs was used by the TARPO prioritization subcommittee to form the TARPO draft list of projects to be submitted on May 1st 2017. All

comments will be reviewed by the TARPO Prioritization Subcommittee to refine their final project list, which will be presented for approval by the TARPO RTAC on August 10th. Additionally, this transportation needs list for the MPO area and any comments from the Chatham County Board of Commissioners will be incorporated into the development of the final draft list for submittal in the coming months for the MPO.

TARPO Prioritization Subcommittee Draft Project List for Prioritization 5.0 – May 1, 2017

This is the draft list of projects developed by the TARPO Prioritization Subcommittee at their May 1, 2017 meeting for submittal to NCDOT's Prioritization 5.0 process for funding. This list is being circulated for review and comment by local jurisdictions and the general public until June 30, 2017, at which time all received comments will be provided to the TARPO Prioritization Subcommittee for their further consideration. The TARPO Rural Transportation Advisory Committee (RTAC) will vote on the *final* list of projects at its August 10, 2017 meeting.

Please note that in addition to the "new" projects listed below, there are also a few projects that will automatically carry-forward for consideration from Prioritization 4.0 (which took place in 2015-16). These carry-over projects are: (1) A130488 and A130489, Raleigh Executive Jetport (Lee County) corporate hangar apron expansion; (2) H090669, widening US 15-501 between Aberdeen and Laurinburg; (3) H090296, NC 5 modernization and turn lanes in Aberdeen; (4) H150663, synchronized street on US 1 in Lee County from US 15-501 to Pendergrass; (5) H150922, Pinehurst Traffic Circle improvements; and (6) H140374A, NC 54 widening in Orange County from Orange Grove Rd to Old Fayetteville Rd.

The "new" projects listed below are not shown in any particular order, but are arranged by county to make the list easier to read. TARPO is limited to submitting a maximum of 22 projects in each mode of transportation (highway, bicycle/pedestrian, transit, rail, and aviation).

PUBLIC INPUT SESSION

Erika Lindemann submitted the following comments:

Hello. My name is Erika Lindemann, and I have lived at 308 Creeks Edge in Mann's Chapel Precinct for 37 years. I also serve as the Secretary of the Chatham County Democratic Party, which held its annual convention in Pittsboro on Saturday, April 8. At that convention, approximately 100 delegates who represented all but one of the precincts in Chatham County, adopted a resolution respectfully requesting that the Chatham County Commissioners vote to expand this board to seven members. The resolution also urges the immediate appointment of a citizen advisory committee with proportional representation from Chatham Republican, Unaffiliated, and Democratic registered voters to evaluate the pros and cons of district and countywide at-large representation, or a combination of the two, for electing the commissioners. The goal of this advisory committee would be to bringing forward a recommendation to the County Commissioners by the end of 2017. The resolution offers several reasons for pursuing this course. While the current five-member board has been the format for many years, with each member residing in his or her district but running for election countywide, the demands and workload on a county commissioner have increased since 1980. The County has also experienced significant growth since then, much of it in the northern and eastern sections of the county. That growth will continue, and it seems reasonable to reflect this increase in the makeup of the Board. It is also the case that several counties in this part of North Carolina have more than five elected officials representing its residents as county commissioners: Lee, Johnston, Orange, Franklin, Granville, and Wake counties are examples. The resolution requests that the Board be expanded, but it leaves up to a Board appointed, representative citizen advisory committee the task of evaluating the pros and cons of how this representation should be determined. Shall some or all of the commissioners be elected countywide? Shall some commissioners represent districts and others be at-large members? The resolution calls for a report and recommendation to be brought to this Board by the end of 2017-but that the process begin as soon as possible. Thank you for considering this request to expand the Board.

John Wagner submitted the following comments:

I am a resident of Hadley Township. I am here because I saw that Briar Chapel is requesting the elimination of a 100 foot buffer along parcel 2832. I urge the commissioners to deny that request. Chatham County is losing forests and buffers too fast. It is being given away when there is absolutely no reason to do it. Briar Chapel has plenty of land and they can place their pump station anywhere they want. It may require losing a home site and putting a pump station there but that is definitely preferable for the county, for our environment, for our wildlife. Buffers are absolutely essential for wildlife. Environmental corridors are not fluff, they are not something that just gets added when necessary or when a sub-development decides it is going to do that. Instead environmental corridors are essential. They have to be

respected and protected. I encourage you in this particular case and in all the cases that are coming up in the coming year, respect the buffers. Especially when you are deaing with large subdivisions that have lots of options. Don't allow the buffers to be sliced up and taken away. This is something they could have planned ahead and they don't need the buffer taken away.

Jan Nichols submitted the following comments:

I would like to take a moment to commend the members of the Board of Commissioners for their leadership and for our County Manager Renee Paschal and her staff for their work on behalf of all the citizens of Chatham County. I am here this evening to present a second resolution that was passed at the Chatham County Democratic Party's Convention on Saturday, April 8. This is regarding our support for a county municipal fund. In the whereas clauses we strategically are concentrating growth in municipal areas and avoiding sprawl growth into Chatham County's rural areas. This has been a goal for Chatham County policy makers for many years. Whereas we have three municipalities, Goldston, Pittsboro and Siler City that operate completely within the boundaries of the county and have consistent need for critical infrastructure investment and community investment. Whereas the EDC utilizes a policy driven approach to improve the lives of county residents by supporting infrastructure improvements and preservation of the county's strong quality of place. Whereas one of these strategic goals of Chatham County Economic Development Corporation is to support Chatham County and its municipalities in their efforts to identify critical infrastructure needs. Greater financial cooperation between the municipalities and the county can be advanced by direct investment from the county into its municipalities. Therefore we ask or resolve that the Chatham County Board of Commissioners consider establishing a line item in its annual budget to provide direct funding to the municipal government units of Goldston, Pittsboro and Siler City and that said funds would be allocated on a per capita basis, either using the latest population estimates from the state demographer and or the most recent census with said funds to be allocated to request such as matching grants, infrastructure improvements, etc.

Rhonda Whitley submitted the following comments:

I live in Moncure. I am two years new to the area. Unfortunately when I bought my home none of this was in the works. I knew there was industry close by and now between the coal ash and what goes on on Corinth Road, you guys should try to come and travel that road. If it doesn't make your adrenaline go up, nothing will. We have had a leachate truck flip over on an unpaved gravel road and also on Corinth Road. These are the things we are already putting up with for the coal ash. Some of you accepted money for that. Maybe you only have a half a million tons to bring to us, we will see what happens with that. My big concern is that I moved into a community to live in the country because I thought it was clean. In the country we all take care of each other. Slowly the bottom line is trapping us all in. I know the county needs money. It takes money for the world to work but to do it this way, Moncure is what, 711 people? That small community is bearing the brunt of produce, produce, produce. I don't really think it is fair. Maybe one day you should go buy a salad, take the top off, put some salad dressing on it and then sit there for the thirty minutes you have to wait for the coal ash train to go by. Or go down Moncure Flatwood and sit there with your salad open and then take a bite. I can promise you that you will probably spit it out because of the grit. Please when you consider this megasite, please be very careful about those of us that have to drive to the recycle center. Those of us that have to deal with this on a regular basis because we are the

ones really suffering. I hope you really take it seriously. It also smells bad. That whole stretch of the road is most unpleasant.

Randy Voller submitted the following comments:

I am here to speak on behalf of that municipal fund. As we have discussed in the past I think it would be a great idea if this Board could figure out how to get such a fund formed and provide a method to allocate either the grants or zero interest loans on a per capita basis to the municipalities because it would be a good method to elimnate the constant back and forth between the boards for small projects. Jan Nichols' time ran out so I am going to fininsh the resolution. At the convention the delegates did pass the resolution that they wanted the funds to be allocated on a per capita basis, either using the latest population estimates from the state demographer and or the most recent census. The funds would be allocated to requests such as matching grants, infrastructure improvements and potable water which we all know is despeartely needed around this county. Re-use water, which we know is gonig to be an excellent way to provide water for the infrastructure and businesses we are bringing in here. We already provide re-use water to 3M. Purple pipe, waste water, downtown redevelopment, parks and recreation projects, municipal buildings and projects that would fall under the category of public works. It just seems to me that this would be an elegant solution to the constant back and forth that you are going to see over the next ten to twenty years between the municipalities and the county for these type of requests. If there was such a fund, then the municipalities would know that we have x amount of dollars there. We don't have to come to the county with our hat in hand every two minutes to say we need \$50,000 or \$30,000 and at the same time you would have an elegant method to allocate it up front and know how much money would be spent. I am just asking for you to explore this and talk with the municipalities about such an opportunity. I see on todays agenda that there are requests showing what Siler City has done and I think such a program could fold in and help them. Obviously we want them to be successful. We want them to attract businesses and I think having such a fund would give them ease by knowing that every year there was x amount of dollars in the fund that Siler City could ask for.

Pam Cash Roper submitted the following comments:

My name is Pam Cash-Roper and I reside at 38 Winston Way, Building 167, Apartment 108, in Pittsboro, NC. I am here this evening to support a resolution that passed at the Chatham County Democratic Party's Convention on Saturday, April 8th regarding the expansion of the board of commissioners from five to seven members. I am a lifetime resident of Chatham County and my family has been here for generations. The County has had the current system for as long as I can remember and it is about time that we explored changing our current system. The county is growing and it seems reasonable for the BOC to adjust for this growth. More to the point, without adding two at large members to the board, the districts will always be trailing the last census and thus certain areas of the county may become underrepresented or over represented--depending on the influx or outflow of people to a particular district. Also, with portions of our county becoming more urbanized and other portions remaining rural this could also be an excellent opportunity to explore balancing this rural/urban situation as well. I respectfully request that the county immediately appoint a committee to begin working on this issue and that the committee be composed of at least one officer from the Democratic and Republican parties as well as citizens who are Democrats, Independents, and Republicans. The County should supply the appropriate staff member to this committee and it should be instructed to give a report back to the BOC by the end of 2017. Thank you for your

time and consideration.

Lesley Landis submitted the following comments:

I want to support the suggestion to expand the board with the understanding as previous folks have said that our county is growing. It was recently noted that Chatham County is the second fastest growing county in North Carolina. As leaders, you need to look ahead and anticipate need and solve the problems the needs create. I hope that you will consider the suggestion of expanding the board. Similarly, I also want to add the idea of looking into permanent voting centers. This last November election was very busy particularly at the early voting site on Andrews Store Road. It seemed sadly too small. I know our Board of Elections does a fabulous job, I think a lot of the work they do but given the robust engagement by Chatham County citizens I hope there is a solution to this need for permanent election sites. Thank you.

Virginia Penley submitted the following comments:

I have lived in Chatham County for over forty years. I have witnessed the county change from nearly all rural to what it has become today. The pace of growth and the changes in our county demand that we explore potential changes to the Board of Commissioners. Further I have heard and read plans many times to expand our board and for many years. The time has come to answer this call. You guys have a lot to do, you should expand the board. I respectfully requests that the County Board of Commissioners move to appoint a committee to study our current five member system and recommend reasonable solutions to the Board of Commissioners by the end of this year. County Manager Renee Paschal gave a presentation to the Board. (Presentation attached)

Chairman Crawford opened the hearing.

Lewis Fadley, Siler City Town Commissioner, submitted the following comments on behalf of the Siler City Town Board:

I am here about the CAM site and Renee did a wonderful job presenting the information. In any business venture you have to weigh the pros and cons. On the town level I have been able to identify some cons. One con is the perception of double dipping and this is a scenario where you spend public dollars to increase the value of the land and that thereby increases the purchase price. It is a great problem to have. I think it would be great for the county as a whole. I think it is reasonable to believe that we could get some assistance from the State and as Renee pointed out

we could also adjust our incentives policy. If it occurs, it is a wonderful problem to have and I think it is very solvable. Economic Development versus environmental impact, it is a balancing act. You have to do it on essentially every case that comes before you. In this case though, I don't think that those goals are mutually exclusive. I think the option actually allows you to have some control over the economic development if you control one aspect then you by definition control the other. I think that is going to be helpful in maintaining the balance and helping the Board determine that balance and helping you be able to be in a position to look at that issue. Economic development is coming to the county one way or the other. It is coming from chickens, it is coming from Chatham Park, it is coming from everywhere. It is good becauses it is bringing this into the county. This does allow you to keep your finger on the pulse and maintain that balance. I would like to talk about some pros, which Renee has touched on. First of all this keeps us in the game. You can't win if you don't play. The County has put a lot of time and energy and money into keeping us in the game. I think it would be very much a shame if we decided to step out of the game at this point. We are pretty far down the road. We've got a certified site, another certified site on the way. I think it would be a shame to throw away all that time, all that energy, all that money at this point. I really do believe that there is a synergy between the Siler City CAM site and the Moncure site. No other county can boast two sites. I don't think any other state can boast two sites. I don't think any other state can boast two sister sites. They are not in competition, they support. Chatham County is the only county that I know of in the state and in the nation that can boast that. I think it bodes well to bring a manufacturing presence to our county. It does meet the Golden Leaf \$4 million condition. We have to meet that condition in order to access that money. We do not want to leave \$4 million on the table. We want to be able to exercise that \$4 million Golden Leaf opportunity. As Renee said, we don't have to actually purchase it on the back end, we just have to have it under public control right now. That is just on the Siler City side. Then you have the Moncure side. I don't want to spillover too much because I know that there is public comment coming up for Moncure. The fact that we have all that money available is tremendous. It will not only help our economy, it will help the environment. Anytime you are improving water, water quality or anything connected with water it is going to help the economy and the environment. That is a win-win. It creates jobs. Jobs helps with another issue that we have in our county which is affordable housing. Obviously if people have jobs, they have money in their back pocket. They can afford to go get a loan at a bank for a place to live. An increase in jobs will have the effect of helping our affordable housing issue. Lastly, last year when we were here we were on bended knee begging you to approve the option. We were not in a position to help at all. This year is a little bit different. Our financial situation has improved. The option is drastically different. This year Siler City is in a position to put its money where its mouth is and help you all with the decision to the tune of \$25,000 per year. On behalf of the Town Board, the Town Manager's Office and the citizens of Siler City we do believe that the pros outweigh the cons of this option and we are requesting that you approve the option. Thank you.

Barbara McKinley submitted the following comments:

Thank you for your committment to Chatham County residents and all your work. I have been a county resident and landowner since 1988. I am very committed to the people of this county. A lot of the concerns that I've had, environmental issues and how it is going to impact any of the cons in our area have become less worrisome. I think in Chatham County we have different populations in different areas. We have different concerns and different hopes. On the Siler City side, everyone that I have talked to I don't think I have heard one person speak against it. I hope you take that into consideration. Thank you.

Randy Voller submitted the following comments:

I would hope that my comments could be incorporated into both sites. I don't want to speak twice. I am speaking as the President of the Labor Caucus for the North Carolina Democratic Party. Unlike a lot of folks in this area I grew up in a region with significant industrial development on Lake Michigan. I grew up in northwest Indiana and Chicago. My father worked for a steel manufacturer. I understand what you are getting into and it is quite significant. I just want to speak about liveable wages. I am not here to say pro or con to this. I think that the County Manager did a great job in giving the presentation. In this county liveable wages are about \$24-\$27 a household. That figure is adjusted depending on how many dependents you have. You could have two people earning \$12 or \$13 and hour or one person earning \$25 or \$26 an hour. As we go down this process I think that it is important that we are aware of the wages that are going to be paid so that this is beneficial to Chatham County as a whole. I don't know if we are going to get an automotive site. I grew up around big steel and big automotive. You could get one, it is possible. If we did it would have a significant homerun impact on the entire region. If we did get one I would hope we would be plugging for union jobs or at least saying we want jobs that are going to pay good wages with health benefits so that we don't just bring more people in here that are not being paid the kind of wages and are not able to spend the kind of money you want in Siler City. These kind of projects pay for themselves. If they are going to come here, they know what their balance sheet is going to be. They understand their P&L's and they understand their business plan. You are probably not going to get as many jobs as I saw growing up because you are gonig to get robots. I know that these can be well paying jobs. I would hope that there would be some stipulations that you have that some of the purchasing would go local and or regional. I am not here to say how you work this out. Perhaps the EDC could come to you and give you some ideas. I would hope that you would seek opportunities that some of our local and regional suppliers would be involved in this. Depending on how this all plays out, if it doesn't turn out that you might go the way you want, continue to press to purchase the site at the best possible price. If possible, explore opportunities with potential manufacturers to look into installing solar panels on these sites. I would like to offer something for you to think about. Depending on what happens with this land in Moncure, if you get a million gallons, that is 8,333 bedrooms by the figures that the state uses, 120 gallons per day or 2,777 three bedroom homes. If you are going down the route of pursuing industrial/manufacturing type uses you are probably going to stick to it. The other side is you could end up with more residential development which is not what I believe this whole process is about. Thank you.

Judy Hogan submitted the following comments:

Commissioners and all those present: I am Judy Hogan, living in Moncure on

Moncure-Pittsboro Road, and Chair of the Chatham Citizens Against Coal Ash Dump since 2015. You know that Judge Carl Fox ruled March 31, that Charah, Duke Energy's Coal Ash Disposal Company, has lost its permits to excavate in the Brickhaven mine in Moncure. There may be an appeal, but right now the county can expect no more money from Duke because only 3-1/2 million tons have been dumped there. The County received \$6 million as advance against 4 million tons of coal ash dumped in Brickhaven. 2 million was spent on Moncure fire trucks, some on monitoring, and on the Sprott Youth Center. You've promised \$3.4 million for sewer to and from Sanford for the megasite. Do you still have it, get to keep it? Don't expect more from Duke, please. Coal ash is toxic, and the toxins are showing up on the monitoring that you have done. We don't want any more. People here are getting sick from what we have so far. As to the megasite planned for Moncure, I don't know where it is to be, but I have several major concerns: 1) We should have no more polluting companies or dumps. Moncure has been dumped on and/or poisoned for more than 20 years. People have died from this pollution. No more! 2) Our roads are curvy and narrow. They are already overcrowded with large trucks carrying logs, leachate, coal ash, wood chips, etc. If Moncure-Pittsboro, Old #One, and Corinth Roads are widened, our small homes near the road may be destroyed. We are not rich here in the village of Moncure, most are working class. We have much sickness already, but we are a community, rare these days. Road widening would be destructive. I want the commissioners to consider the human beings who live here now, and depend on our air, our water, our small property for our lives. Please remember us when you think big and into the future. We have little children, elderly. We have 40% African-American, and most of us are low-income. Think small as well as big, please. Think human beings, not just tax revenues.

John Wagner submitted the following comments:

You all have some hard decisions here. I really encourage you to think very carefully about the lure of big money versus helping the county. I know that jobs are an important issue but so is the future of this county in terms of the environment, the health, and the future generations. If you bring in big industry to Moncure, which has already been hurt for decades, I am worried that you are not going to be able to keep out the kinds of industry that would be high automation and high pollution instead of jobs. Our national trend at the moment is to deregulate. We have government which wants to remove the ability to control air and water pollution. If you bring in industry you also bring in the risk that you may not be able to stop very dirty industry. I think you need to remember that this money, this big money that you are anxious to get ahold of was brought in as Golden Leaf money because of a dirty industry, the tobacco industry, which caused health problems for the state. That is why you have this money. To bring in industries that would cause more health problems to Moncure, which is already dealing with coal ash, seems absurd. Finally, you have got some coal ash money that Duke provided. \$50,000 has been used for environmental testing and this testing is going to be needed for a very long time. Don't spend the money that needs to be done to provide water for Moncure and environmental testing for Moncure so that you can bring in another dirty industry. Thank you.

Chatham County Schools Chief Operations Officer Chris Blice and Director of Maintenance and Construction Randy Drumheller addressed the Board.

Mr. Blice stated they are requesting the Board approve the purchase price of the school site on Andrews Store Road for the building of an elementary school. The purchase price of the school site is \$750,000.

Vice Chair Hales asked how many acres they need for the building. Mr. Drumheller stated five to six acres. Mr. Blice stated one of the advantages of this site is that it is located right across the street from the existing park. The school would be able to use those fields. The school is scheduled to open in the fall of 2020.

Mr. Blice stated the amount of buildable land is being adjusted in Conditional Use Permit (CUP) that Briar Chapel has submitted. The school will accommodate up to 750 students.

The Board discussed that the purchase of the property is a separate issue from the CUP. If the Board does not approve Briar Chapel's CUP, Briar Chapel will let the schools out of the contract.

Vote to Approve a Resolution Opposing House Bill 436 (Elimination of Local Government Impact Fees That Fund Infrastructure Needs)

Town of Siler City Resolution Opposing HB436 signed 4-3-2017

The County Manager stated this bill would affect school and water impact fees. The bill would repeal all impact fee authority in the state. The funds for the imapct fees go

into the debt reserve and they help pay past, current and future debt service on the county schools. The county has basically already spent its impact fees for schools. The county's impact fees are based on a 1996 study and the county is using construction costs that are twenty-one years old. The county has been very judicious and cautious about increasing the school impact fees. The last time it was increased was in January of 2008. The water impact fees have been in affect since 2006 and the fees have not been raised since that time. Those fees will go to fund the regional intake and water treatment plant on Jordan Lake that the county is partnering with Durham, OWASA and the Town of Pittsboro. If the authority for both those impact fees get taken away, the impact is equivalent to 4.7 cents on the tax rate. The school impact fees are equivalent to 2.8 cents on the tax rate.

The County Manager stated the bill has passed the local government committee in the House and it is now in the Finance Committee. Debra Henzey and former county commissioner Brian Bock went and addressed the Local Government Committee. They were given one minute to speak on the bill. The Manager does think the county has a fighting chance to get this bill defeated, especially with the help of Ms. Henzey.

Chairman Crawford read the resolution into the record.

Commissioner Dasher stated the Board appreciates former commissioner Brian Bock for his assistance in this matter.

Broad national policy objectives on aging

Grants to states for community planning & services—nationwide aging infrastructure

States required to develop a "comprehensive and coordinated service system" in partnership with AAAs (1973)

Area Agencies on Aging

Located in the regional Councils of Government. AAAs have functions in five basic areas:

(1) advocacy; (2) planning; (3) program and resource development; (4) information brokerage; and (5) funds administration and quality assurance.



Comprehensive systems of services include:

Access services - such as transportation, outreach, and assessment;

Community services - such as congregate meals, education, legal services and counseling, elder abuse services, and senior center programs;

In-home services - such as home health, in-home aide, and home-delivered meals.

The Chatham County Council on Aging

The Council promotes and supports independent living, and the physical and mental wellness of persons aged 60 and older through a wide range of services. The Council also supports family caregivers of older adults striving to remain at home. Special emphasis is given to reaching the socially and economically needy, and in particular, those who are not eligible for Medicaid but cannot afford to pay for services themselves.

Overview of Home and Community Care Block Grant (HCCBG)



General Assembly established HCCBG in July 1992

Combined federal Older Americans Act, Social Services Block Grant (SSBG) in support of respite, and relevant State Appropriations

Gave counties greater discretion and authority in determining services, service levels, and providers

Counties choose among 17 eligible services

Focus on supporting frail elderly at home, improving physical & mental health, assisting with access to services & information, providing family caregiver relief, and helping seniors remain active

Development of the County Funding Plan—County Board of Commissioners' responsibilities for the planning, coordination, and implementation of the county funding plan:

- •Designation of an agency or office within the county with lead responsibility for planning and coordination of the county funding plan. The designation can be for more than one (1) year. The length of designation is at the discretion of the board of commissioners.
- •Appointment of a committee to serve as a Block Grant Advisory Committee to the lead agency for planning and coordination in the development of the county funding plan. The length committee members' appointment is determined by the board of commissioners. The Division strongly recommends that older adults comprise no less than 1/3 of Advisory Committee membership.
- •Ensuring that the county funding plan is in compliance with budgetary instructions provided by the Division of Aging and Adult Services.
- •Submission of the recommended county funding plan to the area agency on aging and entering into a grant agreement with the area agency on aging.





COA is expected to collaborate with other health and human services agencies.



Service Priorities

Once community service providers have determined that individuals meet the eligibility criteria for a given service as specified in the service standard, individuals must be served in the following priority order:

- Older adults for whom the need for Adult Protective Services has been substantiated by the local department of social services and the service is needed as part of the adult protective service plan.
- 2. Older adults who are at risk of abuse, neglect, and/or exploitation.
- Older adults with extensive impairments in activities of daily living (ADL's), or instrumental activities of daily living (IADL's), who are at risk of placement or substitute care.

"ADL's" include: eating, dressing, bathing, toileting, bowel and bladder control,

Importance of Nutrition



- Prevalence of obesity in US is increasing in all age groups. Over past 30 years, the proportion of obese older adults has doubled. Obesity was the #1 priority in Chatham's 2014 Health Assessment.
- Food insecurity is complex, not only can it lead to under-nutrition and recurring hunger, but also to over-nutrition which can lead to overweight and obesity.
- Malnutrition among older adults is well documented.
- •COA is providing congregate, frozen/shelf-stable, and home-delivered meals—and nutrition education.
- Meals on Wheels clients report improved health (83%), security (87%), and independence (92%).

Malnutrition is a serious senior health issue. — Mayo Clinic Without support from programs like Meals on Wheels, millions of seniors are forced to prematurely trade their homes for nursing facilities. Meals on Wheels for an entire year costs the same as spending one day in the hospital or ten days in a nursing home.

Client is blind and returning back to her home at the end of July. Her granddaughter-in-law is trying to set up Meals on Wheels for her and possibly in-home aide services.

Client has diabetes, Pacemaker put in August 2013, hypertension. Needs personal care, assist with bath, laundry, fold client's clothes, take trashout, On Wednesday pull trash to drive way to be picked up and light housekeeping.

Client is looking to get her bathroom modified. She lives alone and uses a walker all the time. She has a bathtub in her bathroom that she cannot use because she is unsteady and falls when she does. Also may need a lift chair.

Client came home from the hospital; inquirer is concerned that family members aren't doing enough for him (hinted at some family discontent). Primary concern though is the heat- his A/C recently went out (some sort of pump issue), but thinks that he would benefit form Meals on Wheels as well.

Service Definitions

In-Home Aide

The provision of paraprofessional services which assist functionally impaired older adults and/or their families with essential home management, personal care and/or supervision necessary to enable the older adult to remain at home as long as possible.

Home-Delivered Meals [Meals-on-Wheels]

The provision of a home delivered meal that provides 1/3 of the Recommended Daily Dietary Allowance to a homebound older adult.

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Service Definitions

Information and Options Counseling

Information and Options Counseling is a service designed to link persons with resources available to meet their needs and/or interests. The primary goal of the service is to provide a continuum of access services (information, assistance and options counseling) to facilitate informed decision-making about the range of long-term services and supports and serve a key role in the streamlined access to supports.

Senior Center Operations

Operation of a multipurpose senior center includes the provision of a broad spectrum of services and activities for older adults. The primary objectives of a multipurpose senior center are: the centralized provision of services which address the special needs of older adults; opportunities for older adults to become more involved in the community; and the prevention of loneliness and premature institutionalization by promoting personal independence and wellness.

Service Definitions

Congregate Nutrition

A service which assists older adults, their families and others acting on behalf of older adults, in their efforts to acquire information about programs and services and to assist older persons with obtaining appropriate services to meet their needs. Options Counseling provides guidance to individuals as they make informed choices about long-term services and supports.

Volunteer Program Development

Volunteer Program Development is the development of a systematic process of utilizing volunteers of all ages to support community services for older adults.

Service Definition

Health Promotion & Disease Prevention

The purpose of Title IIIB Health Promotion and Disease Prevention Services is to provide health promotion and disease prevention services to older adults who need them. This service can be used to support activities that may not be allowable with Title IIID funds. Examples of allowable programs are NC Senior Games activities, chair aerobic programs and exercise equipment.







Introduction & Background:

Zoning: Conditional Use Permit for Planned Unit Development (PUD)

Water: Chatham County

Sewer: Private Wastewater Treatment Plant

Watershed District: WSIV-PA Within 100 year flood: No

Fearrington PUD was originally approved in 1976 as a Planned Unit Development with a master plan allowing for mixed uses and has continued to develop over time. Fearrington PUD is reviewed under the pre-2008 Subdivision Regulations and the 1994 Watershed Ordinance.

Fearrington has 1602 approved residential units (includes Galloway Ridge) with 185 lots/units remaining to be developed. Fearrington is exempt from the Chatham County Stormwater Ordinance, but is not exempt from the Jordan Lake Buffer requirements. The project is subject to the Chatham County Soil Erosion and Sedimentation Control Ordinance. In 2010 the Board of County Commissioners granted approval of a sketch design revision to a 1999 PUD plan which included all the remaining undeveloped land within the PUD and included Section X. In 2012 another sketch plan revision was approved for Section X. In 2016, the PUD was revised to add "Tyrell" street off Richmond, and to relocate six (6) lots. The 2016 revision did not add any additional lots.

Area A, Millcreek, consisting of 29 lots and Area B, Burke Place, consisting of 12 lots in Section X have received final plat approval. The Planning Board has two (2) meetings to make a recommendation.

Discussion & Analysis:

The request before the Board is for preliminary plat review and approval of Section X, Area "C" - Richmond, consisting of 21 lots on 17.8 acres. As stated above, a new street, Tyrell, was added to Area C in 2016. Another change to the original lot layout was the deletion of (8) single-family clustered homes in order to have three (3) larger, single family home sites. The cluster homes would have been located on area now shown as Lots 4401, 4403, 4405 The change from clustered homes to single family did not require a change to the roadway layout or the utility plan.

Water: County water is available and will be utilized. The Water Main Extension Permit and the Authorization to Construct, dated January 30, 2017 issued by North Carolina Water Resources have been provided.

Sewer: Sewer service is provided by the Fearrington private WWTP. Alan Keith, P.E., Diehl & Phillips, P. A. has provided a letter stating that the WWTP has sufficient capacity to serve Section X, Area C. Mr. Diehl's letter also states that "Fitch Creations, Inc. has Authorization to Construct an expansion to the wastewater treatment plan from the North Carolina Division of Environmental Quality". The Wastewater Collections System Extension Permit, issued by the North Carolina Water Resources, dated October 28, 2016 has been provided.

The applicant has also provided a buffer authorization from Dan LaMontagne, P. E. Chatham County Watershed Administrator, dated January 25, 2017 for impact to Zone 1 & Zone 2 for construction of a private 20-ft wide sanitary sewer line associated with the development of Section X, Areas C and D of the Fearrington Subdivision. The impacts are only valid for impacts associated with the proposed 20-ft wide sanitary sewer, drainage & access easement as depicted on the plans.

Zone 1 consist of the first 30 feet landward measured from the particular surface water body.

Zone 2 begins at the outer edge of Zone One and extends landward the distance required for the combined width of Zone 1 and Zone 2 to equal the riparian buffer width specified for the particular surface water feature. For example, Zone 2 for intermittent streams shall be 20 feet and Zone 2 for a perennial stream shall be 70 feet.

Roadways: The streets, Richmond and Tyrell, are proposed to be public, state maintained roads. The Road Plan Approval for Section X, Area C, dated February 24, 2017 issued by NCDOT has been provided.

Road Names: The road names Richmond and Tyrell have been approved by the Chatham County Emergency Operations Office as acceptable to submit for approval by the Board of County Commissioners.

The permits listed above can be viewed on the Planning Department webpage at www.chathamnc.org/planning Rezoning & Subdivision Cases, 2017.

Stormwater: Fearrington is not subject to the Chatham County Stormwater Ordinance.

Water Features: Fearrington is subject to the 1994 Watershed Ordinance which required a 50 foot riparian buffer along perennial and intermittent waters not within 2500 feet of rivers. Ephemeral features were not required to be buffered, The developer has provided an additional 50 foot buffer along Bush Creek, a perennial feature, for a total of 100 feet and has provided a voluntary 30 foot per side riparian buffer along an ephemeral feature running along Lots 4603, 4600, 4602, 4604, and 4606. There is also an intermittent stream with a 50 foot per side riparian buffer plus a

10 foot no-build area. The property lines for lots adjacent to the streams go to the center of the water feature.

Open Space: There is an open space area between Lots 4703 & 4407. A portion of the ephemeral channel is located in the open space. The open space area will be transferred to a homeowners association. Area 'C' is adjacent to private property owned by T. H. Lingerfeldt and to Henderson Place, an adjacent subdivision. A fifty foot wide perimeter buffer is shown on the preliminary plat. Lots adjacent to the perimeter buffer will each own a portion of the buffer. Per Mr. Sears, the perimeter buffer is a no-build area; however, per a note on the plat, a trail system can be placed in the perimeter buffer along with utilities and storm water control devices, additional ornamental and evergreen trees can be placed; and invasive species of vegetation can be removed. The restrictions placed on the perimeter buffer are private and not required by Chatham County. Per Mr. Sears, the developer of Fearrington normally does not grade in those areas but it is allowed. An existing trail easement extends from the Burke Place cul-de-sac, through Area 'C', to Henderson Place.

Technical Review Committee: The TRC reviewed the request on March 15th. There were no issues of concern.

The developer has provided five (5) sets of full construction plans which are available in the Planning Department if you would like a copy for review.

The Planning Board met on April 4th to review the request. Dan Sears, Sears Design Group, P. A. and Alan Keith, P. E., Diehl and Phillips were present to represent the developer. There was one question from the Board regarding how run-off from the roadways was managed. Per Mr. Keith, Fearrington has incorporated some low impact development techniques on lots and strives for diffuse flow on release points near required buffers.

Recommendation:

The Planning Board by unanimous vote and Planning Department recommends granting approval of the road names Richmond and Tyrell and approval of Preliminary Plat as submitted.

Introduction & Background:

NNP-Briar Chapel is requesting a waiver from the perimeter buffer requirements of the Compact Communities Ordinance as applied to Briar Chapel through the approved conditional use permit. Existing buffer locations were depicted in the 2005 Briar Chapel approved master plan and reconfirmed with the 2012 and 2014 Conditional Use Permit (CUP) amendments in the area where the elimination of the buffer is requested. The buffer for this request is located within an area along the project boundary south of the wastewater treatment plant (WWTP) on the approved master plan (copy of the currently approved master plan is attached). The specific request is to allow for 100% reduction of the perimeter buffer adjacent to parcel #2832 of approximately 496 feet.

Discussion & Analysis:

The Chatham County CCO includes the following standards:

9.2 Perimeter Buffers

Perimeter buffers shall be utilized to minimize the impacts of each compact community on adjacent properties along the entire perimeter of the compact community. Table 9.2 lists the minimum buffer width allowable, depending on the proposed land use along the edge of the compact community and the existing land use in the adjacent property at any point along the perimeter.

Chatham County may allow a reduction in the perimeter buffer width required by this ordinance of up to fifty percent (50%) if it determines that the impact of the compact community is adequately mitigated by community design or topography. In addition, Chatham County may allow a reduction in

the perimeter buffer from fifty-one percent (51%) up to one hundred percent (100%) after giving the adjoining landowners an opportunity to comment and Chatham County determines that the impact of the compact community is adequately mitigated by the community design or topography. A developer of a Compact Community may request of the Board of Commissioners such a waiver or reduction at any time.

Section 15. Waiver, "With the approval of the Board of Commissioners, the requirements of this ordinance may be adjusted, modified, reduced or waived based upon the absence of any reasonable relationship or nexus between the impact of the compact community development and the inclusionary or other requirements set forth herein."

The request is to eliminate the 100' buffer immediately adjacent to property currently owned by NNP Briar Chapel LLC (parcel #2832) to accommodate a road stub-out, additional residential lots, and sewer pump station (see attached drawings in the submittal materials. The cover letter references a waiver of the 100' buffer along the shared boundary between Briar Chapel and the US Steele Tract, which was approved for a conservation subdivision. This waiver request was approved as part of the 2014 conditional use permit amendment and was not processed as a stand-alone request (refer to attached 2014 master plan) and there were no adjoining property owners affected by the perimeter buffer elimination.

The provision in section 9.2 allowing for the 100% reduction of the perimeter buffer reads: "In addition, Chatham County may allow a reduction in the perimeter buffer from fifty-one percent (51%) up to one hundred percent (100%) after giving the adjoining landowners an opportunity to comment and Chatham County determines that the impact of the compact community is adequately mitigated by the community design or topography." The applicant, and county, contacted the owners of the two properties immediately adjoining the area where the buffer is proposed to be eliminated. One of the owners responded and provided a written response to the request, which is attached. Newland Communities also provided updated exhibits showing the relocation of a proposed sanitary sewer pump station 75' from the adjoining property and a replanting plan. The adjoining property owner indicated that they were in agreement with the proposal.

This waiver request is being submitted directly to the Board of Commissioners without review and recommendation by the Planning Board and follows the process outlined by the Board in a waiver request approved in August 2010. The waiver provision was used to modify a condition in the original conditional use permit in 2005. Additionally, requests in 2010, 2012 and 2016 were approved outside of the conditional use permitting process. A waiver request was submitted in 2015 and was ultimately withdrawn. A copy of the draft Order was provided to the County Attorney for review.

The subdivision process is a four (4) step process: Concept Plan, First Plat, Construction Plan, and Final Plat. The applicant has completed the Concept Plan

review along with the community meeting.

Discussion & Analysis:

This request is for First Plat review and recommendation of Westview at Norwood Estates, consisting of 49 lots and located off Mann's Chapel Road, SR-1532. A vicinity map showing the property location is included in this packet, attachment # 2. Per the Subdivision Regulations, Section 5.2C (4), during a First Plat review, the first Planning Board meeting shall include a <u>Public Hearing</u> to receive comment on the proposed subdivision. Item (b) states that following the Public Hearing, the Planning Board shall review the proposal, staff recommendation, and public comments and indicate their recommendation for approval, disapproval or approval subject to modifications. The Planning Board has two (2) meetings to act on the proposal.

Community Meeting: A community meeting was held on October 20, 2016 at the Mt. Pleasant UMC Church. The purpose of the meeting was to receive input from the

community on the project. Fifteen (15) people attended the meeting. A copy of the meeting report is included in this packet, attachment # 3.Questions were raised regarding the road alignment / stream crossing and lot line adjustments in order to place homes closer to the street when possible.

Septic: A soils report and map, attachment # 4, were prepared by G. Christopher Murray, Piedmont Environmental Associates, PA. Mr. Murray stated in the report "In this instance there does appear to be soils for conventional and/or drip type septic systems." Per the soils map, there is adequate soil for individual on-site septic systems for each lot, except for lot 1 that is proposed to have an off-site septic systems which will be on Lot 1A. A buffer authorization from Chatham County may be required for installation of the septic systems for Lots 1/1A and Lot 49. Thomas Boyce, Chatham County Lead Soil Scientist, reviewed the report and map and found them adequate.

Water: County water will be utilized. The utility/waterline layout is shown on the First Plat. A Water Plan Permit and Authorization to Construct will be provided with the Construction Plan submittal.

Roadway: Roadways are proposed to be public, state maintained roads. There is one proposed stream crossing that will require a buffer authorization from Chatham County.

The subject property is adjacent to two developed subdivisions, Heartland Grove and The Settlement. Heartland Grove received final plat approval in 2003 for 34 lots. There was discussion about the developer of Heartland Grove providing a dedication of public right-of-way to the Norwood property. However, due to objections by the developer and the Norwood property having sufficient state road frontage on Mann's Chapel Road, the Board of Commissioners did not require a dedication of public right-of-way for a future interconnecting roadway. The Settlement consisting of 47 lots was approved in 1999/2000. Wilkinson Creek is a boundary between The Settlement and the Norwood property and since there was floodable area along the creek, no interconnecting roadway was required. Parcel #1717 consist of 22.25 acres and has state road frontage on Lamont Norwood Road. The boundary between the subject property and parcel #1717 is also Wilkinson Creek. Staff does not recommend any dedication of public right-of-way to parcel #1717 due to having to cross Wilkinson Per the engineer, NCDOT will require a right lane Creek and floodable area. deceleration lane. A road plan approval for both the subdivision road and the deceleration lane will be provided with the Construction Plan submittal.

Road Names: The road names Stonecrest Lane and Kenwood Way have been approved by the Emergency Operations Office for submittal to the Board of Commissioners.

Historical: In January, 2017, the applicant hired TRC Solutions to perform a limited background research and field survey for two small family cemeteries located on the subject property. The primary goals were to document the cemeteries and to establish a 15 foot buffer zone around each for preservation purposes. There are two cemeteries and their locations are shown on the First Plat. Each cemetery will be on an open space lot. Cemetery 1 appears to have 13 graves and cemetery 2 appears to have 5 graves. Bev Wiggins with the Chatham County Historical Association visited the two cemeteries. Mrs. Wiggins was able to do more in-depth research on the families buried in the two cemeteries. From her research, it appears the graves belong to the R. L. and Carrie Fearrington family and Lester and Martha Cotton family

and that the families may have been sharecropping or renting the Norwood property. See attachment # 6 for the full report. The developer plans to install fencing around the cemetery areas as designated by TRC Solutions. The cemeteries will be left in their natural state.

Stormwater and Erosion Control: Two stormwater ponds are proposed and will be placed on lots designated as Community Space. A Stormwater Permit and an Erosion Control Permit will be obtained from Chatham County prior to submittal of the Construction Plan. No work can commence on the property prior to obtaining the Erosion Control Permit and Construction Plan Approval.

Riparian Buffers/Wetlands: A wetland Delineation and Stream Evaluation report was prepared by personnel from Sage Ecological Services, Inc. Drew Blake, Environmental Officer with Chatham County Land & Water Resources Division and Sean Clark with Sage Ecological Services made a site visit to the subject property on November 21, 2016 to verify the previous determinations made by Sage Ecological. Per Mr. Blake's report, attachment # 7-A, there are three (3) ephemeral segments, four (4) intermittent segments, four (4) perennial segments (including Wilkinson Creek), and twenty-one (21) potential wetlands on the property. Andrew Williams, Regulatory Project Manager, U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, made a site visit on January 27, 2017 to verify the existence of the wetlands. See attachment # 7. All features identified will have the required buffers that range from 30 feet per side to 100 feet per side, measured from the bank of the stream or edge of the wetland, There is floodable area along Wilkinson Creek as shown on the First Plat. See attachment # 9 for the stream legend.

Environmental Documentation: Section 6.2 A of the Subdivision Regulations states "Any proposed subdivision of forty-nine lots or less shall be required to submit Environmental Documentation to the County. The Environmental Documentation shall include the information required by the General Environmental Documentation Submittal

Form developed by the Environmental Quality Department." Mark Ashness, P.E., CE Group prepared the Environmental Documentation, Attachment # 8, and submitted the document to Brian Burkhart, Environmental Quality Director for review and approval. Mr. Burkhart review and approved the Environmental Documentation.

School Notification: The developer has notified the Chatham County School system regarding the proposed 49 lot Subdivision, located off Mann's Chapel Road and provided a vicinity map and site plan.

Technical Review Committee: The TRC met on March 15, 2017 for staff review of the First Plat. Staff, including Tom Bender, Fire Marshal; Larry Bridges, Utilities Director; and Drew Blake, Environmental Officer, discussed the project. There were no issues of concern at that time.

Site Visit: The Subdivision Regulations, Section 5.2 C (3-c) requires two dates for site visits for county staff, advisory board, and elected officials. The site visits were held on March 14 and 16th. Ms. Emily Moose was present for the March 14th site visit. On March 16th, the developer, Keith Brown, and the engineer, Mark Ashness conducted a site visit for Planning staff along with Planning Board members George Lucier, Caroline Siverson, and Bill Arthur. The property has been logged in the past and now consist of pine forest, hardwoods, and small regrowth trees. Per Mr. Ashness, the developer will only clear necessary area for the roadway and stormwater ponds and the lot clearing will be done by the owner/builder on a per lot basis. Those

attending the site visits were shown the general lay of the land, the location of the proposed roadways, the cemeteries, and various water features, including Wilkinson Creek.

It is Planning Department staff's opinion that the First Plat meets the requirements of the Subdivision Regulations.

The Planning Board met on April 4th to review the request. Keith Brown, Sun Forest Systems, developer and Mark Ashness, P.E., CE Group were present to answer questions. A public hearing was held on the request. One person spoke, Ms. Cindy Norwood Marshall. Ms. Marshall stated that she was speaking on behalf of the Norwood family; that the land had been in her family for more than 100 years; and that her family is in support of the proposed development. A copy of Ms. Norwood's comments are on file in the Planning Department. The public hearing was adjourned. Mr. Ashness spoke and stated that the developer wished to change the name of the subdivision to Stonecrest at Norwood Subdivision and change the road names to Stonecrest Lane and Kenwood Way; and that the Emergency Operations Office had approved the names as suitable for submittal. Mr. Ashness also stated that the Planning Board had been provided a copy of the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers Notification of Jurisdictional Determination and the signed Jurisdictional Determination Wetland maps dated March 30, 2017. Discussion by the Planning Board followed. Questions/comments included comments received at the community meeting being addressed in writing; appreciation that the cemeteries were going to be fenced and ongoing maintenance of the cemeteries; roadway crossing of the stream and steepness of stream; the Environmental Documentation report information from older data; Conservation Subdivision possibility; and access to off-site septic areas. Brown stated that he planned to put a placard on the cemetery fence regarding the information known about the families buried there. Mr. Ashness stated that the stream crossing would be less than the allowed 150' of disturbance; that the information provided in the Environmental Documentation was taken from data previously provided on the County GIS site; that a Conservation Subdivision was not feasible because the small number of lots did not support construction of a waste water treatment plant; and that the pockets of suitable soil area did not allow for a community septic system; that the stream crossings on Lot #'s 1/1A & 49 would be made by a bore under the stream bed as allowed by Chatham County Environmental Health. The Board had no other questions/comments.

Recommendation:

The Planning Board by unanimous vote and Planning Department recommend granting approval of the road names Stonecrest Lane and Kenwood Way and approval of the First Plat with the following conditions:

- 1. The Construction Plan shall label the cemeteries as Cemetery 1 and Cemetery 2
- 2. The Construction Plan shall state the width of riparian buffers.
- 3. The Construction Plan and all related permits shall reflect the subdivision name "Stonecrest at Norwood Crossing" and the road names Stonecrest Lane and Kenwood Way.
- 4. The two cemeteries shall be fenced with a placard placed on each.







The Chatham-Cary Joint Land Use Plan (JLUP) was adopted by the Chatham County Board of Commissioners and Town of Cary Board in June, 2012 with an effective date of July 1, 2012. The Plan is an official policy document adopted by the Chatham County Board of Commissioners and Cary Town Council meant to guide future land use, public infrastructure improvements and development in the Plan Area. The County and Town also approved an interlocal agreement regarding the plan, which can be viewed on the following website - http://www.chathamnc.org/index.aspx? page=441> . Section 5d of the agreement outlines the process for citizen initiated plan amendments. The process requires that applications be submitted to both jurisdictions for consideration and that the County has to make a recommendation prior to the Town taking final action. Approval by both jurisdictions is required for an amendment to be incorporated into the plan.

The public hearing request was submitted by Glenda Toppe on behalf of Highcroft Commons, LLC to amend the joint plan map.
