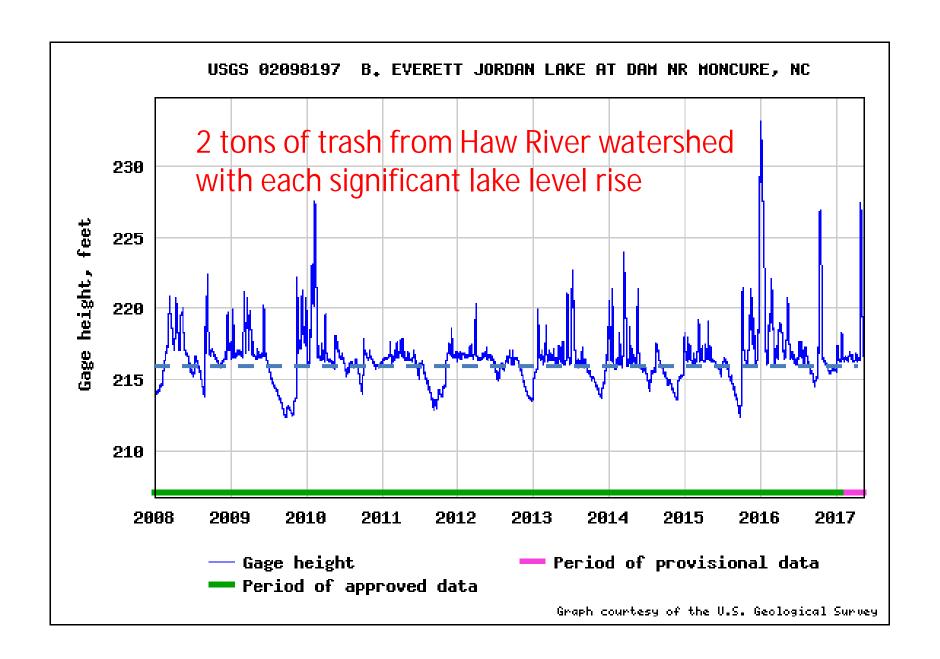

80% Flushed Off Watershed with Rainfall



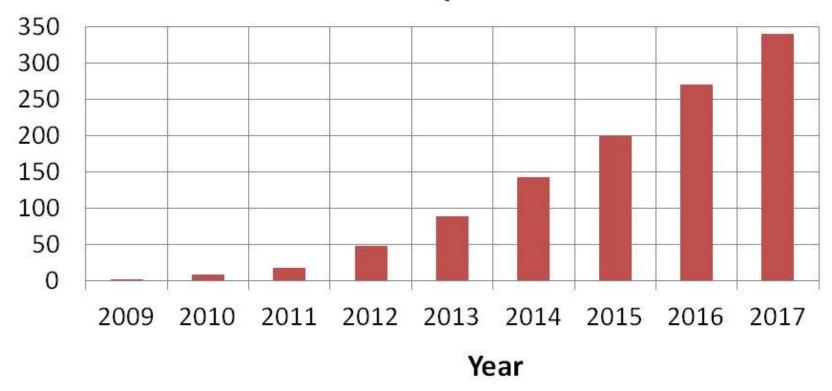




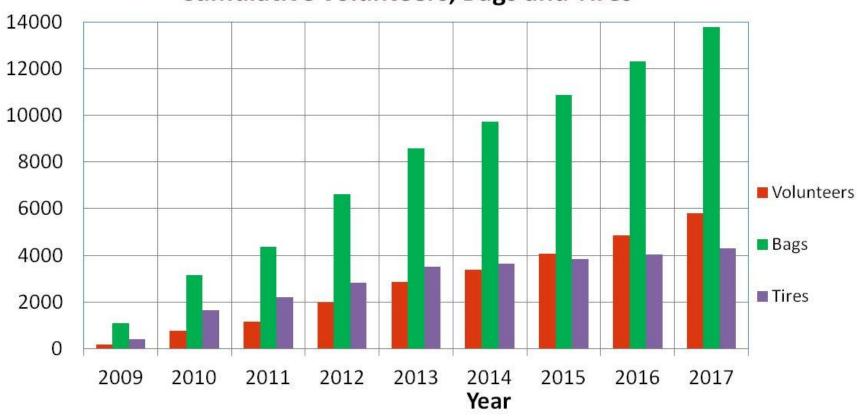

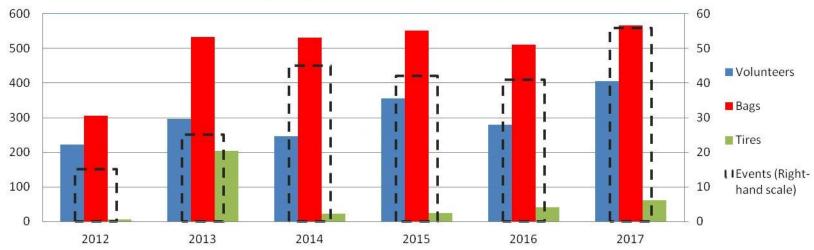

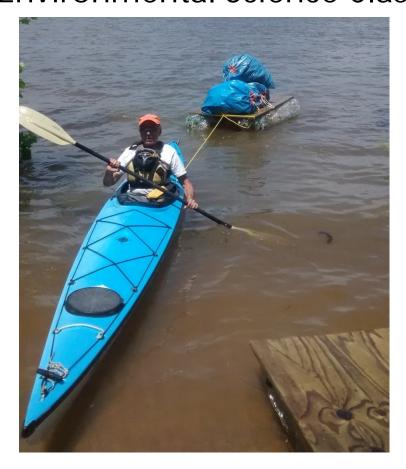

### **Action Requested:**

A request by the Planning Department to schedule a legislative public hearing for April 16th, 2018 to consider County-initiated rezonings of businesses in the formerly unzoned portion of Chatham County.

#### Introduction & Background:

After nearly two years of discussion and study, on August 15th, 2016, the Chatham County Board of Commissioners voted to zone the formerly unzoned portions of the county to R-1 and R-5 residential. The Comprehensive Land Use Plan specifically supports "rezonings for businesses uses or properties made non-conforming by the extension of zoning in 2016." (Land Use Policy #7, Strategy 7.2). Consequently, prior to the adoption of county-wide zoning, the Chatham County Planning Department sent a business listing form to every property owner in the unzoned portion of the county. Nearly 13,000 forms were mailed. The business listing form asked property owners to list any non-residential use of their land, so the Planning Department could properly document any non-conforming uses and prepare for future rezonings. The Planning Department received over 1,000 forms. Approximately 300 forms described non-conforming businesses, while the remaining 700 listed either agricultural uses of the land (which were exempted from zoning regulations via the bona fide farm exemption) or otherwise permitted uses, such as a residence. Aerial images of these 300 businesses were captured, as well, in order to further establish non-conforming status.

### **Discussion & Analysis:**

In addition to mailing and documenting business listing forms, Planning staff compiled tax and fire inspection records to determine if there were any other businesses in the formerly unzoned portions of the county. After combining tax and fire inspection records, along with the business listing forms, staff determined that 524 parcels in the formerly unzoned part of the county may contain non-conforming uses or businesses. In order to confirm that these non-conforming uses actually existed, staff performed site visits to each parcel, spoke with the property owners, and documented the current use of the property. After several months of visiting properties, the following observations were made by staff:

- 204 parcels appear to be eligible for rezoning to a non-residential zoning district
- 48 parcels are eligible for the issuance of a home occupation permit (HOP)
- 272 parcels are not eligible for rezoning or issuance of a home occupation permit

During the site visiting process, the interior of multiple parcels were inaccessible to staff due to "No Trespassing" signage, the presence of loose dogs, or physical barriers, such as locked gates, fences, or washed out roads. However, the tax data, aerial imagery, and some visual confirmation from the site visits allowed staff to recommend rezonings, issuance of HOPs, or maintenance of the status quo for these parcels.

Based on the observed use, staff determined which zoning classification would be most appropriate to consider to use for rezoning the property. Since many uses are permitted in multiple zoning classifications, staff recommended that the parcels be eligible for rezoning to the least intensive permitted zoning classifications possible. For example, if a use were allowed in both light and heavy industrial zoning district, then staff recommended that the parcel should be eligible to be rezoned to the light industrial classification. Furthermore, some uses are permitted in an R-1 or R-5 district with the issuance of Conditional Use Permit. It should be noted that many of the non-conforming uses on parcels eligible for rezoning do not occur across the entirety of the parcels. Many uses are limited to a single building or small portion of the parcel.

After the inventory of businesses was completed, the next step was to meet with property owners eligible for a rezoning to determine if they wish to rezone their property, and if so, how much of the property they would like to rezone. Planning staff contacted property owners and scheduled these meetings. Additionally, planning staff coordinated with representatives from the Chatham County Tax Department, as the issue of changes in tax value was likely to arise. In addition, on March 1st, at the direction of the Board of Commissioners, Planning staff also sent a letter to 35 property owners who have vacant buildings on their property in the formerly unzoned portion of the county, offering them the opportunity to request a rezoning to any zoning district. These vacant buildings had been previously identified by Planning staff during site visits in the summer of 2017.

Out of 251 properties that were identified as having a non-conforming use, 52 parcels were requested by their owners to be rezoned, 20 parcels were requested to remain in their current zoning district, and 180 parcels' owners did not respond to the letter regarding rezoning, yielding a response rate of 28.28%. Out of 51 Home Occupation permit applications sent out to properties that qualified for an HOP, 17 have been completed and returned to Planning staff.

Since the list of properties that will be considered for rezoning has been finalized for this first round of rezonings, Planning staff is now ready to move forward with a County-initiated rezoning of these business properties. It should be noted that Planning staff will most likely receive more requests for eligible businesses to be rezoned in the future. We will follow up with the Board of

Commissioners later this year to request a public hearing for those additional rezonings.

### How does this relate to the Comprehensive Plan:

Goal #4: Diversify the tax base and generate more high-quality, in-county jobs to reduce dependence on residential property taxes, create economic opportunity and reduce out-commuting. Specifically, Land Use Policy #7, Strategy 7.2 supports "rezonings for businesses uses or properties made non-conforming by the extension of zoning in 2016."

### Recommendation:

It is the recommendation of Planning staff to schedule a legislative public hearing for April 16th, 2018 to consider County-initiated rezonings of the properties described in the attachment.

Chair Hales had difficulty reconciling the Plan Chatham goals with the BOC goals. She understood the Plan Chatham goals to be more specific and determined in certain arenas

Community Relations Director Debra Henzey stated that all of the commissioners recognized the need for the goals to correspond but also appreciated the difficulty of relating the two sets of goals.

Commissioner Howard expressed concern for ensuring that Plan Chatham is encapsulated in such a way that the main goals remain consistent, despite any changes in staff or BOC members. Ms. Paschal believes that the best way to achieve this is by making sure that staff continues to buy into the Plan goals.

Vice Chair Dasher questioned the idea of merging the two sets of goals. He believes that the Plan Chatham goals should remain static but the BOC goals should be more fluid. Ms. Nealon proposed that the Board plan for goals that can be dynamic for years to come.

Commissioner Petty wanted know whether the staff ever felt that the two sets of goals were conflicting or at odds with one another. Ms. Paschal said that the possibility exists but that awareness of both goals would help staff to find a balance.

Commissioner Petty would like to explore the possibility of establishing a minimum of goals met before implementing any sort of action. He would like to know specifically what staff is looking for. Ms. Paschal responded by saying that the Comprehensive Plan goals do not necessarily meet all the needs of the community. She would like to see the BOC goals fill in some of these gaps.

Commissioner Crawford would like to see public safety added as a BOC goal.

Vice Chair Dasher posed the question as to whether or not the BOC Goal 3 was necessary considering its presence in the Comprehensive Plan.

Commissioner Crawford proposed eliminating BOC Goal 3 except "while recognizing the differing needs and factors across the county" because several parts of that goal are in Plan Chatham. He suggested moving the rest of the goal to annual working goals.

Vice Chair Dasher asked to park the saved part of Goal 3 and come back to it later. He suggested adding it to Goal 2.

Vice Chair Dasher suggested tweaking Goal 4 to be more inclusive of other human services beyond education.

Commissioner Howard said she didn't know that she wanted to bring anything additional to Goal 4.

Ms. Nealon asked if it is necessary to have this specific goal of education in both the Comprehensive Plan and the BOC goals or if it was redundant? Vice Chair Dasher stated Goal 4 is similar to Goal 9 of Plan Chatham and asked do we want it in two places?

Ms. Paschal stated the Board of Education and the CCCC Board of Trustees make the policies and the county has to fund them.

Vice Chair Dasher asked what kind of direction it would provide staff to reword Goal 4.

Ms. Paschal stated it may be necessary to have a BOC goal for education to sell to the public. The current wording is good direction to staff.

The Board agreed they were happy with Goal 1. Goal 2 was merged with Goal 3 and Goal 4.

Ms. Nealon asked the Board to think about a new goal around human services.

Commissioner Petty believes that human services are touched on throughout several of the other goals. He inquired as to whether or not human services should be given its own goal or if the other goals should be modified to reflect this need. Vice Chair Dasher said he supports the latter. Commissioner Howard thinks that a new goal might be necessary to adequately address the problem. Ms. Paschal suggested that maybe human services be addressed as an objective or objectives under the umbrella of one

of the broader BOC goals. The Board agreed to add a modified statement proposed by DSS Director Jennie Kristianson as an objective to Goal 2 to address human services.

Chair Hales suggested that maybe public safety could also be added as an objective to a broader BOC goal. Vice Chair Dasher expressed concern that these goals may not be as durable or lasting under BOC goals as they might be under Plan Chatham goals. The Board generally seemed to agree that Chatham County is fairly safe and that they don't hear a lot of negative feedback from their constituents but Commissioner Petty did raise the point that closed cases do not necessarily equate to solved crimes.

Commissioner Petty asked if public safety fits under "service needs of our residents"?

Vice Chair Dasher would like to know where more specific direction for the upcoming year will come from.

Ms. Paschal suggested moving the dialogue towards the metrics for success. Ms. Nealon facilitated this shift with the consent of the Board.

#### Metrics for Goal 1:

- Clean audit annually
- Maintain healthy fund balance
- Fully funding the debt model
- AAA bond rating
- Adhering to financial policies Ms. Paschal believes this covers the first three metrics. Staff can go back to the financial policies and come up with metrics for first four

#### Metrics for Goal 2:

- Maintain or improve customer survey results
- Response times
- Measuring quality of service: ISO ratings
- Increase in population percentage served, segments or overall?
- Maintain property tax rate
- More opportunities for citizen engagement: website traffic, meeting attendance, applications for committees, expand outreach

Ms. Paschal stated staff should be able to bring an update to the Board before next year's retreat on how departments are doing with the metrics.

#### Metrics for Goal 4:

- Reduced class sizes
- Expanded curriculum
- Benchmark per student spending: does more mean better?
- Measure of "support": meet demands (annual requests), cover impacts of HB13, teacher retention rates (teacher support), quality of physical structures, relationship, trust and open and timely communication
- Reporting back on issues from other policy making boards

After much discussion, the Board agreed to the following three goals:

 Demonstrate sound fiscal stewardship to ensure we can meet the important service needs of our residents.

- 2. Provide effective, efficient government that is responsive to the differing needs of residents across the county.
- 3. Support Pre-K through 12 and the community college in providing a quality education for all students.

Commissioner Crawford stated Chatham Promise is good for economic development and it is doing right by our students. Other counties have already implemented this as well as the state of Tennessee.

Commissioner Howard asked if this would exclude home school and charter school students. Commissioner Crawford stated it is for students in public schools. The County Manager stated public schools would include charter schools.

Vice Chair Dasher asked what would be the cost of funding it.

Chair Hales stated Lee County is doing a pilot program.

Commissioner Howard asked if the program strictly covers the cost of tuition. Commissioner Crawford confirmed that the program only covers tuition.

CCCC Provost Dr. Mark Hall stated a student must be full time to graduate in two years. Part time students would lose funding after two years. They must have already earned some credits in high school to participate in the program. Funding would cover the tuition and fees but not books. Full time tuition is \$1,200 for in-state students for four classes per semester.

Commissioner Howard asked if there is anything to address transportation. Dr. Hall said there is some federal funding to address that. Commissioner Howard asked if students can take courses at multiple campuses. Dr. Hall stated they could.

Chatham County Schools Superintendent Dr. Derrick Jordan stated Chatham County Schools are schools under the Board of Education.

The County Manager asked if this would be for all Chatham County Students (including students who attend charter schools outside of the county) or students only in Chatham County Schools. After some discussion the Board agreed that the program should be available to all Chatham County residents who are graduates of public schools.

Vice Chair Dasher asked if students must apply for Pell grants to be considered for Chatham Promise. Dr. Hall stated yes. Students would complete a FAFSA and CCCC's internal scholarship application. The appropriation from the County would fill in the gaps.

Dr. Jordan stated the Board of Education endorses this concept but are concerned

about a decrease in allotment to K-12 schools.

Commissioner Howard asked if funding is provided, can excess funding be utilized for text books. Dr. Hall stated they can certainly consider that.

Vice Chair Dasher would like to know long term costs. If this is funded on an annual basis, the Board will be making a promise to an eighth grader that in five years this will program will be available.

### **PUBLIC INPUT SESSION**

Billie Medlin submitted the following comments:

My name is Billie Medlin and I live at 220 Half Dollar Road, Chapel Hill, North Carolina. I have lived on the family farm in North Chatham for 86 years. I am here to open a conversation with the Board of Commissioners and Briar Chapel management. I attended a 2005 meeting where I was told Half Dollar Road would not be connected to Briar Chapel as a condition to start building. Currently, Briar Chapel has circulated a map with draft plans and limited communication. We are asking for an open forum for input. The commissioners will receive constant updates about shared citizen concerns and opposition until I hear at a future commissioner meeting that Half Dollar Road will not be connected to Briar Chapel.

Don Medlin submitted the following comments:

We are attending all of the Board meetings, both Planning Board and Board of Commissioners, in order to make certain and have assurance that Briar Chapel is going to have an open communication. Thank you.

Larry Brooks submitted the following comments:

I come here to ask for your support in relocating the confederate statue. I am here not only for what I stand for but what you and all people in Chatham County should stand for. The Town of Pittsboro is in the midst of making substantial changes and growth with the influx of new communities and businesses. I have lived in Chatham County for most of my life and have not seen this type of growth at any time. As a resident of Chatham County, the monument which stands in front of the Historic Courthouse represents segregation and racism instead of equality for all, which is governed by the law. The statue which has a permanent place in the Town of Pittsboro should not stand in the way of progress for Pittsboro or Chatham County. I ask for your support in the relocation of the confederate statue and ensure the people of Chatham County feel they are equally represented and that the town and county are not in support of racial discrimination. Thank you.

Jean Willoughby submitted the following comments:

Thank you for the opportunity to address you. I've prepared a statement regarding the Confederate States of America (CSA) monument on the grounds of the Chatham County Courthouse. I've lived in Chatham County for about eight years, working in agriculture at local organizations and now for a national land trust. I've also had the opportunity to work with many farmers in the county.

I'm originally from Arkansas and have generations of family history in the South. I'm well acquainted with Southern history and culture. Southern culture is many things to many people, of course, and I'm not one to generalize too much. However, I've observed that we can often be polite at the expense of honesty and that we're sometimes too quiet about matters that deserve to be talked about openly. When I moved to Chatham County, I begrudgingly accepted the presence of the CSA monument as another one of those "Southern things." Sadly, I'm sure many of us can relate

After eight years of passing by the CSA monument, I had the experience of meeting with other community members, many of whom are people of color or African American, at various community gatherings where I heard about how this monument has negatively affected them and how its presence at the Courthouse has incited exclusion, fear, and shame. That is unacceptable. I respectfully ask that you work to relocate the Confederate monument from the Courthouse grounds to another location. I hope you will also facilitate community dialogues and educational initiatives regarding the history of the monument, so that county residents can learn together and grow better connected as a result. There are more than 95 monuments honoring the Confederacy in North Carolina according to state records, and approximately 1,500 across the country, according to a 2016 review by the Southern Poverty Law Center. That means we have an important opportunity, perhaps even an ethical responsibility, to strive to serve as a model for both our state and our country through how we choose to address this issue.

Specifically regarding the monument in Chatham County, I have three points I'd like to offer:

1. First, I'd like to echo another statement recently made to the Commissioners by another county resident, who said: "It is possible to acknowledge your history without sanitizing it." The proposed relocation of the CSA monument from public grounds would not constitute an erasure or a sanitation of our history. Instead, it would mark a deeper acknowledgement of the meaning of our history and its consequences. As others have noted, the CSA statue was placed in its current location in 1907, decades after the Civil War ended. Three years after the war, the Gettysburg Battlefield Memorial Association invited Confederate General Robert E. Lee to the historic site "for the purpose of marking upon the ground by enduring memorials of granite the positions and movements of the armies on the field," which he declined, replying with his now famous admonition, "I think it wiser, moreover, not to keep open the sores of war but to follow the examples of those nations who endeavored to obliterate the marks of civil strife, to commit to oblivion the feelings engendered." It's time we follow his advice, particularly considering that the CSA monument, like the Confederate flag, is as much a symbol of the Jim Crow era as it is of Confederate history. It is part of our history as Americans, but it should not be located in a place where it could deter our citizens or act as a racially-charged symbol of violence and

exclusion on public grounds, in turn undermining our system of representative democracy.

- 2. The CSA monument reads: "Our Confederate Heroes." I'd like to offer a close reading of this phrase in part because it's bothered me for about eight years now. "Our" can be a word of inclusion-our courthouse, our democracy, our country- but in this context it was and is used, perversely, to exclude. "Confederate" refers to someone who fought for the Confederacy, an unrecognized country formed only by slave-holding states that seceded from our nation, that took up arms against it, and that explicitly sought to defend slavery. Mississippi's declaration of secession, for example, read: "Our position is thoroughly identified with the institution of slavery the greatest material interest of the world." "Its labor supplies the product which constitutes by far the largest and most important portions of cornmerce of the earth." Lastly, "heroes." Two words: They lost. It requires courage to face battle, but it is not heroic to fight for an unjust cause. I fail to see why a rogue and long-defunct political entity should continue to be deemed heroic on our public grounds.
- 3. Ultimately, if it doesn't break our hearts to know that many of our neighbors and fellow citizens may have felt unwelcome here and that their participation was unwanted-that their pursuit of justice, or their basic right to be heard at meetings like this one was in any way discouraged-due in no small part to the presence of this monument to the Confederacy, then I'm not sure what else can be said. But I will say in closing that I have faith that our neighbors can and will work together to find a solution, one that shows us to be people who care about each other as much as we care about this place we call home.

Wil Warren with ThirdWave Housing gave the Board an update on Henry Siler School. The application has been submitted last month to North Carolina Housing Finance. There were 166 applications but there were only five redevelopment applications. There will be at a minimum two redevelopment projects awarded so the chances are good the Henry Siler School application will be accepted. There will be 44 units, ten in the school and the others in new construction.

Planning Board member George Lucier asked how much land will be cleared. Mr. Shaw showed on the map where land would be cleared. There are no streams on the property.

#### STATE OF NORTH CAROLINA

#### COUNTY OF CHATHAM

This Lease, made and entered into this \_\_\_\_\_ day of April, 2018, by and between Richard E. Fox (hereinafter referred to as the "Landlord"); and County of Chatham, a North Carolina body politic and corporate (hereinafter referred to as the "Tenant");

### WITNESSETH:

That for and in consideration of the rental hereinafter reserved and the covenants and agreements herein contained, Landlord has agreed to lease and does hereby demise and lease unto Tenant, and Tenant has agreed to take and lease and does hereby lease from Landlord, the premises known as <u>Siler City Business Park</u>, 124 Village <u>Lake Road</u>, <u>Siler City</u>, <u>North Carolina 27344</u> and being a building containing approximately <u>1980 square feet</u> of interior space, for use as a sheriff substation, including the parking area adjacent to the said building:

- 1. TERM OF LEASE: The term of this Lease shall be for a period of <u>Two-years commencing at 12:00 noon on the 1st day of June 2018, and ending at 12:00 noon on the 31th day of May, 2020,</u> both dates inclusive.
- 2. RENTAL: The total amount of rental shall be <u>Nineteen-thousand-Four hundred and Forty</u> (\$19,440) Dollars per annum payable in equal monthly installments of <u>One-Thousand-Six hundred-Fifty dollars</u> (\$1,650) Dollars, to be paid on or before the 5th day of each month and the Tenant unless otherwise advised in writing, shall send the monthly rental payment to <u>Richard E. Fox, P. O. Box 563 Siler City, N. C. 27344</u>
- 3. UTILITIES: The Tenant shall pay all reasonable charges for gas, electricity, light, heat, power and telephone or other communication service used, rendered, or supplied upon or in connection with the leased property, and shall indemnify the Landlord against any liability or damages on such account; however, the Landlord will at all times during the term of this Lease, be solely responsible for the cost of water, maintenance and repair of the septic tank and well serving the demised premises, and agrees to keep the same in good repair at all times. Landlord also agrees to pay all costs and expenses incurred in tying into water and sewer lines should that occur during the term of the Lease.
- 4. TAXES: Landlord shall pay, when due, all taxes and assessments of any kind or nature which are now or may hereafter be imposed upon the demised premises; and the Tenant shall pay when due all taxes of any kind or nature imposed or assessed upon the merchandise, inventory or other property installed or brought onto the demised premises by or for the Tenant.
- 5. ALTERATIONS: Tenant may, at its sole cost and expense, from time to time during the term of this Lease, make such alterations, additions or changes, structural or otherwise, in and to the leased premises as it finds necessary or desirable and convenient for its purposes.
- 6. ASSIGNMENT AND SUBLETTING: Tenant or its successors shall have the right to assign or sublet the leased premises in whole or in part, but only upon prior written approval by Landlord, which approval shall not be unreasonably withheld. However, the Tenant herein shall continue to remain liable

notwithstanding such assignment or sublease for the future performance of all of the terms, covenants, and conditions of this Lease.

- 8. INSURANCE: Tenant agrees that it will at all times during the term hereof, at its own expense, maintain and keep in force public liability insurance against claims for bodily injury, death or property damage occurring in or on or about the demised premises and will also provide at its sole cost and expense, such fire and extended coverage and vandalism and malicious mischief insurance covering the contents of the demised premises as the Tenant deems advisable. The Landlord, at its sole cost and expense, shall keep the premises and the building and improvements thereon, to wit: all of the property deemed to be real property under the terms of this Lease insured to the extent of the full replacement cost thereof against loss or damage by fire, with extended coverage.
- 9. DAMAGE AND DESTRUCTION: If the leased premises be damaged or destroyed in whole or in part at any time during the term of this Lease by fire or other casualty. Landlord will within thirty (30) days of the destruction or damage to the property notify the Tenant in writing whither it elects to restore the property or to terminate the Lease. If the Landlord elects not to restore the demised premises, then this Lease shall thereupon terminate and become null and void. However, should the Landlord elect to restore the premises to the condition existing before the damage or destruction, then in that event rent shall be abated according to the amount of square footage available to the Tenant for use to conduct business in while the repair and/or restoration takes place.
- 10. CONDEMNATION: In the event that all of the leased premises shall be taken in condemnation proceedings or by exercise of any right of eminent domain, this Lease shall terminate as of the date of said taking, and all unearned rent and all other charges paid in advance shall be refunded to the Tenant and the Tenant shall surrender possession of the leased premises to Landlord. The award for such taking shall belong to Landlord except that, in the event Tenant expends any sum of money for improvements to the leased premises, which, when completed, constitute part of the real estate, a share of the net award shall belong to Tenant. Tenant shall also be entitled to make claim in its own name to the condemning authorities for the value of any furniture, trade fixtures, trade equipment, merchandise or personal property of any kind belonging to Tenant and not forming part of the real estate, or for the cost of moving all of the same, and any such award made directly to Tenant shall belong entirely to Tenant.

In the event that a portion of, but not all, of the leased premises shall be taken in condemnation proceedings or by exercise of any right of eminent domain and if as a result of such partial taking the ground floor area of the building on the leased premises remaining after the taking is less than eighty (80) percent of the ground floor area of said building prior to the taking, or if the parking area, after the taking, is less than eighty (80) percent of the parking area prior to the taking, then in such event, Tenant shall have the right to terminate this Lease provided the Tenant shall have given notice to Landlord within thirty (30) days after knowledge by Tenant of such taking of Tenant's intention to cancel this Lease. Whereupon, Tenant shall be liable only for the rent up to the time of such taking or the date when Tenant shall vacate the leased premises, whichever date is later, and Tenant shall be entitled to refund of any advanced rentals paid by it for the period subsequent to the latter of such dates.

In the event that Tenant does not exercise its election to cancel this Lease, then and in that event:

a. This Lease shall continue in full force and effect as to the portion of the leased premises not taken for the balance of the term of this Lease; however, the annual rent for the unexpired term shall be reduced by that portion which the area so taken shall bear to the entire area of the demised premises immediately prior to such taking;

- b. Landlord diligently shall make all necessary repairs or alterations to restore the building and/or parking lot to a complete architectural unit.
- 11. REPAIRS: Landlord will keep the roof and the exterior walls of the demised premises and the parking lot in proper repair, provided that in each case Tenant shall have given Landlord prior written notice of the necessity of such repairs. Tenant will keep the interior of the demised premises, which includes, but is not limited to, all the electrical, plumbing, heating, air conditioning and other mechanical installations therein and all plate glass doors and windows in good order and repair. Landlord agrees to be solely responsible for the maintenance and repair of the septic tank and well serving the demised premises, and to keep the same in good repair at all times. Tenant agrees to surrender the demised premises at the expiration or earlier termination of this Lease in as good a condition as when received, excepting only deterioration caused by ordinary wear and tear and damage by fire or other casualty of the kind insured against in standard policies of fire insurance and extended coverage. If Landlord refuses or neglects to repair property as required hereunder and to the reasonable satisfaction of the Tenant, as soon as reasonably possible after written demand, Tenant may make such repairs (but is not required to do so). Landlord shall pay Tenant's costs for making such repairs or Tenant may credit the costs of the repairs against the monthly rental payment or payments thereafter falling due.
- 12. QUIET ENJOYMENT: Tenant, upon paying the rent, and subject to all of the terms and covenants of this Lease, on Tenant's part to be kept, observed, and performed, shall quietly have and enjoy the leased premises during the term of this Lease without hindrance or molestation by any person. Landlord for himself, his heirs, successors and assigns, agrees that Tenant, its successors, and assigns, shall have continuous, peaceful, uninterrupted and exclusive possession and quiet enjoyment of the entire premises during the term of this Lease. The Landlord covenants that at the time of the execution of this Lease, Landlord is in legal possession of the demised premises, has full right to lease the same for the term aforesaid, and will put Tenant in actual possession of the premises hereinbefore provided.

Action Requested: Vote on a request to award the bid for property and liability brokerage services to Surry Insurance Services.

Introduction & Background: Historically, Chatham County has utilized the services of an insurance broker to assist us in finding the best rates for property and liability coverage. For the last three years, BB&T has served as the county's insurance broker. The brokerage term was July 1, 2015 to June 30, 2018. Prior to the FY2019 budget development, a Request for Qualifications (RFQ) was advertised, and four qualified bids were received for our review: Surry Insurance, McB Group, Gallagher, and BB&T Insurance Services. The RFQ was a template that was used in the 2015 RFQ, and other jurisdictions have used over the last 13 years and customized to their own needs. The RFQ was customized extensively by us to meet our specific coverage and risk needs. Discussion & Analysis: A comprehensive evaluation was done in four parts: 1) Review of the bids for completeness and timeliness; 2) Panel interviews conducted with each of the insurance brokers; 3) An evaluation matrix was completed that compared the bids on five (5) criteria; and 4) Reference checks were completed for top two bids received.

- 1. All bids were received and were complete.
- 2. All bidders were interviewed by a panel and asked a series of questions related to the bid and their services. The brokers were provided the questions in advance so that they had ample time to prepare answers.
- 3. A bid evaluation matrix was completed comparing the brokers on five evaluation criteria. This matrix is widely used for both RFPs (request for proposals) and RFQs, and assigns numeric value to the different criteria. The numeric totals help to quantify the rankings to assist in a recommendation.

The evaluation criteria are as follows:

- a. Responsiveness of the proposal to the submission requirements set forth in the RFO
- b. The methods, technical ability, capacity, and flexibility of the firm to perform the contract, including proposed methods to be used in evaluating components of the county's risk management program and ability to provide advice and assistance in

- controlling increasing claim costs on an on-going basis.
- c. Financial viability of the companies the agency represents, client references, demonstrated success in projects with similar requirements and any other contracts with the county.
- d. The overall cost of the risk management services provided by the agency, as well as the quality of service the county can expect to receive on an annual basis, and any fees associated with these services.
- e. The number of public entity property and liability insurance companies and workers compensation companies the agency as access to with an A- rating or better. These commercial insurance companies need to have insured a public entity account in NC within the last five years.

After interviews with each firm and completion of the evaluation matrix, Surry Insurance is recommended to provide brokerage services for the next three fiscal years. Surry provided a strong overview of their services, and the evaluation team felt they were strong financially, quick in their responsiveness to claims and questions, superior in their ability to provide on-site and online training, and qualified to help us develop a more comprehensive approach to risk management services (training, asset review and retention, and claims management) than the other companies interviewed.

How does this relate to the Comprehensive Plan: This relates to Goal #8: Become more resilient by mitigating, responding and adapting to emerging threats. Comprehensive risk management by a qualified broker is critical to the county limiting risk due to normal business activities and emergency situations.

Budgetary Impact: None. Broker fees included in coverage premiums.

Recommendation: Award bid to Surry Insurance for property and liability brokerage services.

Introduction & Background: The Chatham County Personnel Policy was first adopted in June 1991. From time to time, it is necessary to review the current policy and recommend changes that further clarify intent or are no longer relevant or accurate. After careful review, three changes are proposed.

Discussion & Analysis: The following amendments need to be made to the current Personnel Policy: 1. Removal of Emergency Management from Communications notation (departments are now independent of one another); 2. Addition of applicability for employees of the Chatham County Sheriff; and 3. Revision to the list of substances. It is the recommendation of safety professionals that the policy reference the Code of Federal Regulations that details substances rather than listing them out individually. Revisions to our policy as substances change should reduce in number with the more general definition.

### CHATHAM COUNTY ALCOHOL AND DRUG FREE WORKPLACE POLICY

#### **SECTION I:**

#### <u>Purpose</u>

Chatham County is committed to providing an alcohol and drug free workplace for its employees and those who conduct business with the County. This document establishes county policy and procedures for staff whom are responsible for insuring that the letter and spirit of this commitment are communicated and implemented in Chatham County Government.

#### **SECTION II:**

#### Coverage

This policy is intended to cover all employees of Chatham County, regardless of position or origin of appointment. As a condition of employment, employees subject to Federal Department of Transportation Commercial License regulations are required to undergo pre-employment drug/alcohol testing, random drug/alcohol testing as administered by Triangle J Council of Governments, and post-accident drug/alcohol testing. In addition, as a condition of employment, employees in identified safety sensitive positions (Water Treatment Plant Division, Emergency Operations Communications (911) Division, Health Department Animal Control Division) will be required to undergo pre-employment drug/alcohol testing, random drug/alcohol testing as administered by Triangle J Council of Governments, and post-accident drug/alcohol testing. Employees of the Chatham County Sheriff shall be pre-employment tested in accordance with the North Carolina Sheriff's Education and Training Commission Standards.

#### **SECTION III:**

#### **Definitions**

#### Reasonable Cause/Suspicion

Reasonable Cause/Suspicion means an expressible belief based on specific objective facts, and rational inferences drawn from those facts, that an employee has consumed or is under the influence of alcohol or drugs while at work. Circumstances which constitute a basis for determining "reasonable suspicion" may include, but are not limited to:

- A. Observable occurrences, such as direct observation of alcohol or drug use and/or the physical symptoms of being under the influence of alcohol or drugs.
- B. A report of alcohol or drug use, by an employee while at work, provided by a reliable and credible source.
- C. A pattern of unexplained preventable accidents and/or information based on specific objective facts that an employee has caused, or contributed to an accident at work or while conducting county business while under the influence of alcohol or drugs.

- D. Evidence that and employee is involved in the unauthorized manufacture, solicitation, distribution, dispensation, possession, sale or use, of alcohol or drugs while working or while on the County's premises or in possession of or operating a County vehicle, machinery or equipment.
- E. Combative, abusive, violent or disruptive behavior (verbal or physical);
- F. Erratic behavior/mood swings;
- G. Relevant body or breath odors;
- H. Focus of investigation, arrest or conviction for drug related offense;
- I. Evidence of substance abuse or drug test tampering;
- J. A pattern of excessive absenteeism, tardiness or deterioration in work performance in combination with an observable occurrence as described above.

#### **SECTION IV:**

#### **Policy**

- 1. The following are prohibited on County premises and workplaces and while conducting any County business:
  - A. The unlawful manufacture, solicitation, distribution, dispensation, sale, possession or use of controlled substances.
  - B. The unlawful manufacture, possession, sale, distribution or delivery of drug paraphernalia.
  - C. Use of alcoholic beverages.

Any violation of A through C above shall be considered a failure in personal conduct and shall be grounds for disciplinary action up to and including dismissal.

- 2. Impaired behavior and/or diminished performance on the job resulting from the use of alcohol or any controlled substance shall be considered a failure in personal conduct and shall be grounds for disciplinary action up to and including dismissal.
- 3. The County will report violations of criminal drug statutes occurring in the workplace to the appropriate law enforcement officials.
- 4. All employees have a responsibility to report observed and suspected violations of this policy to their supervisor or department head.
- 5. Disciplinary action, up to and including dismissal, shall be taken when an employee:
  - A. Refuses to sign a consent form and participate in a required drug or alcohol test after being advised of the reasons for the request.
  - B. Intentionally tamper, or attempts to tamper, with a drug or alcohol sample or testing process.
  - C. Produces a confirmed positive test result.
- 6. Substances that may be tested for under this policy <u>are consistent with the testing</u> requirements in CFR 49 Part 40. <u>include:</u>

- A. Marijuana/cannabinoids (THC)
- B. Cocaine metabolites
- C. Opiates
- D. Phencyclidine (PCP)
- E. Amphetamines/methamphetamines
- F. Alcohol
- G. Barbiturates (e.g. amobarbital, butabarbital, Phenobarbital, secobarbital)
- H. Methaqualine (Quaalude)
- 7. An employee who receives a positive test may request that the same or split specimen be tested by another certified laboratory with the cost of such testing to be at the employee's expense.
- 8. When management has reasonable cause to believe an employee is using or is under the influence of alcohol or a controlled substance, the employee may be required to submit to an immediate drug and/or alcohol test. The test shall be administered by qualified personnel and shall involve proper procedures of specimen collection and testing.

#### **SECTION V:**

#### Procedures

The following procedures apply when a supervisor has reasonable cause to believe an employee is in violation of the County's Alcohol and Drug Free Workplace Policy.

- 1. Review the circumstances and actions which are the basis for the reasonable cause with the department head and the Human Resources Director.
- 2. The employee may be suspended for investigatory purposes in accordance with established policy.
- 3. In cases which involve possible manufacture, solicitation, distribution, dispensing, selling, or possession of controlled substances in the work place, the department head or designee should contact the local law enforcement agency and State Bureau of Investigation for assistance.
- 4. Document the situation in writing as fully as possible and instruct witnesses to reduce their observations to writing to the extent possible. Documentation should include specific dates, times, people involved, behavior, reactions, overall performance and a general discussion of the circumstances. Once reasonable cause has been established, the employee shall be advised of the following.

In addition to the above, the following is applicable to all County employees:

1. If, with the approval of the department head or designee, a test is warranted, the department head or designee, with a witness present, shall notify the Human Resources Director prior to informing the employee that as a condition of employment, management has the right to require him to submit to a drug or alcohol test. The employee shall be advised of:

- A. Basis for the reasonable cause and the requirement that the employee sign a test consent form;
- B. Methods of testing which may be used;
- C. Substances which may be identified;
- D. Importance of cooperating with the collection site personnel;
- E. Confidentiality of individual test results and
- F. Consequences of refusing to sign consent form, failing to submit to immediate testing, failing to report for a specimen collection, or the receipt of positive test result.
- 2. Immediately after reviewing 1A through 1F above with the employee, employee shall be advised of the location of the test and shall sign a consent form.
- 3. County personnel shall transport the employee to the test site immediately after the consent form is signed if applicable.
- 4. If the employee refuses to sign the consent form or to undergo testing immediately as scheduled, the department head shall take appropriate disciplinary action.
- 5. If a non-positive test occurs, the employee shall be notified immediately by the department head or designee. If the employee has been placed on investigatory suspension he shall be reinstated in accordance with policy requirements. All records surrounding this incident shall be removed from the employee's personnel file. If the test is positive, the department head, within 5 days of the receiving the positive test confirmation, shall inform the employee, in writing, of the results and the proposed action to be taken.
- 6. Disciplinary action resulting from a confirmed positive test, refusal to participate in a test or of altering test results, shall be in accordance with established policies for disciplinary action.
- 7. Drug testing will be carried out by a laboratory certified by the U.S. DHHS and the Triangle J Council of Governments and will be conducted via urine specimen.
- 8. Alcohol testing will meet industry standards or applicable U.S. DHHS and Triangle J Council of Governments guidelines and will be conducted via a saliva, blood or breath specimen.
- 9. All specimens will be collected under chain of custody procedures which may include photo identification of the donor and protocols to assure specimen integrity.
- 10. A positive drug (controlled substance) test will undergo confirmatory testing.
- 11. A positive alcohol test will undergo confirmatory testing by either blood or breath.
- 12. All test results will be maintained in a secure and confidential manner in the County Human Resources Office and will not be released without written consent of the employee unless they are required as a result of action initiated by or on behalf of the employee.

### Resolution of the Chatham County Board of Commissioners

#### Resolution Amending the Chatham County Personnel Policy March 2018

**WHEREAS**, the Chatham County Personnel Policy, adopted March 11, 1996, establishes the general guidelines for employees conduct; and

**WHEREAS**, from time to time it is necessary to amend the Personnel Policy for clarification or to better meet the needs of the employees and the County; and

WHEREAS, internal and external review of the policy identified needed modifications to the policy, and

**NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED,** by the Board of Commissioners of Chatham County, that Personnel Policy be amended as follows:

#### Amend Article VI to add the following:

Section 18: Volunteer Service Leave

#### A. Scope

1. The purpose is to prescribe the policy and procedures by which an employee can participate in volunteer service leave; in order to give back to the community by volunteering at agencies that are licensed, certified, or accredited to service citizens in Chatham County. This policy applies to all regular full-time and part-time Chatham County employees with a minimum of one year of continuous employment with the county.

#### B. Procedure

- 1. The County will grant four (4) hours for the purpose of participating in volunteer activities with an approved list of non-profit agencies. The leave cannot be taken incrementally.
- 2. Employees must apply in advance for volunteer service leave.
- 3. The leave must be approved by the supervisor. Supervisors have the discretion to deny approval depending on the business needs of the department.
- 4. Employees must provide written evidence of the leave in order to receive the appropriate leave credit. Failure to provide the appropriate evidence document will result in the leave being credited as vacation leave. The Volunteer Service Leave Verification Form is required.

- 5. Supervisors who approve requests for leave will maintain a record for each employee and will insure time records are coded appropriately. Departmental requirements may dictate that the verification form be submitted with an employee's time sheet.
- 6. Employees will reflect the appropriate leave code on their timesheet.
- 7. Leave that is not taken will be forfeited at the conclusion of each fiscal year and will not be carried over into the next fiscal year.
- 8. Employee will not be paid for unused leave upon separation from employment.

On January 16, 2018, the Board of Commissioners approved the Purchase Contract for Henry Siler School. Part of that contract called for the county to provide a \$120,000 loan to the developers for the project.

#### Discussion & Analysis:

The attached letters detail the county's commitment to provide the loan for the project. Two letters are requested. Appendix E is precisely written in the format required by the NC Housing Finance Agency, which will consider whether to award the project Low Income Housing Tax Credits. The second letter is more detailed and would be used for other lenders if the project receives tax credits.

#### How does this relate to the Comprehensive Plan:

The plan calls for strategies to incentivize Affordable Housing. The loan provides an incentive to the developer of affordable rental housing.

#### **Budgetary Impact:**

\$120,000 (will be needed in FY 2019).

Dear Mr. Angino:

Chatham County (the "County") is pleased to provisionally commit to loan \$120,000 toward the construction of forty-four (44) Affordable Rental Units on the former Henry Siler School property in Siler City, a key redevelopment for Chatham County (the "Project"). By this letter, the County indicates its intent to loan funds to After School, LLC, subject to the approval of your application for Low Income Housing Tax Credits from North Carolina Housing Finance Agency (NCHFA) for the Project.

The basic terms of our agreement will be as follows:

- 1. <u>Loan Amount</u> The County will loan \$120,000 to After School, LLC for the construction of the Project, provided a federal low income housing tax credit allocation is received from NCHFA.
- 2. <u>Term</u> The term of the non-recourse loan will be 30 years with interest accruing at the long-term adjusted Applicable Federal Rate (AFR) rate which is fixed at closing, currently 1.97%, per year provided that After School, LLC will agree to make the property affordable for low to moderate income residents for 30 years. The deed conveying the property shall contain covenants setting out the requirement that the property remain affordable for thirty (30) years.
- 3. <u>Availability of Funds</u> Chatham County will make one payment of the full Loan Amount at the time of closing on the subject property where the Project is to be constructed. Interest will not accrue until the earlier of 24 months after funding or the property's conversion to permanent loan.
- 4. <u>Security</u> The loan will be secured by a promissory note and a deed of trust, providing the County a third lien security interest after the mortgagor and NCHFA, and subject to no other liens or encumbrance that have not been accepted by the County in writing..
- 5. Repayment The annual principal and interest payments on this loan are only paid from 50% (fifty percent) of cash flow when cash flow exceeds a 1.2 Debt Service Coverage

Ratio (DCR) after the deferred developer fee is paid in full and after the Partnership operating expenses. When repayment of the loan is required per these terms, the County will require annual payments once the Partnership audit is received which will be outlined in the promissory note. If the borrower defaults on the loan agreement, the loan will be due and payable in the full amount of the principal and accrued interest.

- 6. Affordable Housing RFP Application. The Chatham County Affordable Housing RFP Application dated 12/13/17 submitted by Third Wave Housing (the "RFP") is incorporated herein by reference and shall govern the relationship between the parties with respect to this loan except as otherwise specifically set forth in this letter. In the event of any conflict between this letter and the RFP, the provisions of this letter shall control.
- 7. Expiration. This letter of commitment shall be valid until September 27, 2019.
- 8. Affordable Rental Units After School, LLC will agree to make the property affordable to Qualified Tenants for 30 years. A Qualified Tenant is a tenant whose income does not exceed the relevant limit set forth in Section 42(g)(1) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended from time to time, or any corresponding provision or provisions of succeeding law. After School, LLC agrees that the relevant limit shall be 60% of the Area Median Income.

- 1. The Lender has issued a letter of intent (Letter) to Applicant to provide permanent financing in the amount not to exceed \$120,000 (the Loan amount).
- 2. The Letter does not contain any conditions which are not customary and reasonable for loans of this nature and amount and which are not reasonably expected by the Lender to be met at the time of loan funding.
- 3. The loan, if made, shall have a term of at least 30 years, and shall be indexed to the long-term adjusted Applicable Federal Rate (AFR), which is at a current rate of 1.97 %. There shall be no balloon payments due for at least 15 years.
- 4. The amortization period of the loan shall be 30 years with the annual principal and interest payments on this loan only paid from 50% (fifty percent) of cash flow when cash flow exceeds a 1.2 Debt Coverage Ratio (DCR) after the deferred developer fee is paid in full and after annual partnership operational costs.
- 5. The anticipated security interest of the Lender shall be fee simple and the loan will be secured by a promissory note and deed of trust. The Lender is willing to hold a third position in its security interest after the mortgagor and NCHFA.
- 6. The Letter shall be valid until September 29, 2019.

The Board of Commissioners approved the amended Noise Ordinance on February 19, 2018. However, it was brought to staff's attention that some of the language may still create confusion. This Amendment better clarifies the Presumption in Prosecution for Noise Violations (§92.09) and removes Civil Penalties (§92.99).

#### §92.01 DEFINITIONS.

For the purpose of this chapter, the following definitions shall apply unless the context clearly indicates or requires a different meaning.

"A" Weighting Scale. The sound pressure level in decibels as measured with a sound level meter using the "A" weighted network. The standard unit notation is db(A).

db(A). Sound level in decibels determined by the "A" weighting scale of a standard sound level meter having characteristics defined by the American National Standards Institute (ANSI) Publications ANSI, S1.4 4, latest edition.

Ambient Base Noise Level. The average sound pressure level in db(A) during a reasonable period of time, as determined by employing a sound level meter as described in §92.06.

ANSI. American National Standards Institute or its successor organization.

CONSTRUCTION. On-site erection, fabrication, installation, alteration, demolition or removal of any structure, facility or addition thereto, including all related activities, including, but not restricted to, clearing of land, earth moving, blasting and landscaping.

DECIBEL. A unit of measure on a logarithmic scale, of the ratio of the magnitude of a particular sound pressure to a standard reference pressure, which for purposes of this chapter shall be 20 micronewtons/meter.

DISTURBING. Noise that is perceived by a person of ordinary sensibilities as interrupting the normal peace and calm of daily life. In determining whether a noise is unreasonably loud and DISTURBING, the following factors incident to the noise are to be considered: time of day; proximity to occupied residential structures; whether the noise is recurrent, intermittent or constant; the volume and intensity; the character and zoning (if applicable) of the area; whether the noise is related to the normal

operations of a business or other labor activity and whether the noise is subject to being controlled without unreasonable effort or expense to the creator, thereof.

DULY AUTHORIZED INVESTIGATING PERSON OR AGENT. A person or agent is duly authorized if he or she is an employee of the Chatham County Sheriff's Office.

EMERGENCY WORK. Work made necessary to restore property to a safe condition; work required to protect, provide, or prevent persons or property from danger or potential danger; or work by a private or public utility when restoring utility service.

IMPACT NOISE. Sound that occurs intermittently rather than continuously.

PERSON. Any individual, corporation, partnership, firm, association, trust, estate, public or private institution, group, agency, political subdivision of the state any other state or political subdivision or agency thereof or any legal successor, employee, representative, agent or agency of the foregoing.

SOUND LEVEL. In decibels, a weighted sound pressure level determined by the use of a sound level meter whose characteristics and frequency weightings are specified in the ANSI Standard.

SOUND LEVEL METER. Any instrument certified to meet or exceed ANSI standards which includes an omni-directional microphone, an amplifier, an output meter, and frequency weighting network(s) for the measurement of sound level.

SOUND PRESSURE LEVEL. In decibels 20 times the logarithm to the base ten of the ratio of the magnitude of a particular sound to the standard pressure. The standard pressure is 20 micronewtons/meter.

UNREASONABLY LOUD. Noise which is substantially incompatible with the time and location where created to the extent that it interferes with peace or good order.

WEEKDAY. Any day except Sunday.

### §92.02 NOISE; GENERALLY.

<u>Unreasonably</u> loud and disturbing noises prohibited. It shall be unlawful for any person or persons to make, permit, continue or cause to be made or to create any unreasonably loud and disturbing noise in the county regardless of its source.

### §92.03 SOUND LEVEL METER NOT REQUIRED.

A sound meter shall not be required to determine whether a sound is unreasonably loud and disturbing. However, a sound meter may be used as evidence of a violation, provided it is properly calibrated and conforms to ANSI Standards.

### §92.04 MAXIMUM PERMISSIBLE STANDARDS BY RECEIVING LAND.

- (A) The maximum permissible daily standard shall not exceed 60 decibels without a permit by the receiving land. The maximum permissible daily standard with a permit shall not exceed 80 decibels by the receiving land, and shall be immediately reduced to 60 decibels as defined in the time table listed in Section B of this provision.
- (B) Unless a permit has been issued no person shall exceed 60 decibels during the following hours:

MAXIMUM NOISE LIMITATION WITH A PERMIT
Shall not exceed 80 decibels at any time:

SUNDAY- THURSDAY	7:00 a.m9:00 p.m.	up to 80 decibels
FRIDAY- SATURDAY	7:00 a.m11:00 p.m.	up to 80 decibels

### §92.05 EXCEPTIONS.

The following sounds shall be exempt from the provisions of this chapter:

(A) Construction operations from 7:00 a.m. to 9:00 p.m. on weekdays and 8:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. on Sundays for which building permits have been issued, or construction operations not

requiring permits during such hours, provided all equipment is operated in accordance with the manufacturer's specifications and with all standard equipment, manufacturer's mufflers and noise reducing equipment in use and in proper operating condition.

- (B) Noises of safety signals, warning devices, emergency pressure relief valves and church bells.
- (C) Noises resulting from any authorized emergency vehicle when responding to any emergency call or acting in time of emergency.
- (D) Noises at street activities (such as fairs or parades) where the participants have a permit for the conduct of the activity and for the uses of the streets.
- (E) All noises coming from the normal operation of properly equipped aircraft (not including scale model aircraft)
- (F) All noises coming from motor vehicles properly equipped with the manufacturer's standard muffler and noise reducing equipment in use and in proper operating condition.
- (G) Noise from lawful fireworks and noisemakers on holidays.
- (H) Lawn mowers and residential landscaping equipment used between daylight and 9:00 p.m. when operated with all the manufacturer's standard mufflers and noise reducing equipment in use and in proper operating condition.
- (I) Agriculture equipment operated for farming purposes including poultry farming, when operated in accordance with the manufacturer's specifications and with all standard

equipment, including manufacturer's mufflers and noise reducing equipment in use and in proper operating condition.

- (J) Any sound resulting from the natural behavior of farm animals or for animal husbandry purposes in areas where it does not violate local zoning regulations.
- (K) Any sound resulting from activities of a temporary duration permitted by law, and for which a license or permit has been granted by the county or a state or federal agency when the sounds do not exceed the conditions and limits stated in the license or permit.
- (L) Any sound resulting from activities to meet the requirements for training of sworn law enforcement officials and its members using county owned facilities or real property.
- (M) Any sound resulting from an explosive device, which, in the opinion of the Sheriff or Fire Marshal, or Director of Emergency Management, should be deliberately set off in order to secure the safety of the public.
- (N) Any sound resulting from the firing of weapons at a sport shooting range exempted from liability or prosecution under N.C. Gen. Stat. §14-409.46.

### §92.06 SOUND MEASUREMENT STANDARDS.

A sound meter may be used as evidence of a violation provided the following standards are followed:

- (A) Sound level measurement shall be made with a sound level meter using the "A" weighting scale set on "slow response".
- (B) Sound level meters shall be of at least Type Three meeting American National Standards

  Institute (ANSI) S1.4, latest edition REQUIREMENTS. The entire sound measurement system
  shall be serviced and operated as recommended by the manufacturer. Persons using the sound
  level meter shall be trained in should level measurement and the operation of sound level meters.
- (C) Except as provided in division (D) below, noise measurements shall be taken at a point on the complainant's property line nearest the noise source, but when this location is not practicable in the opinion of the duly authorized law enforcement officer because of ambient noise at the complainant's source, or some other factor that is distorting a proper reading, noise measurements shall be made at the boundary of the public or private right-of-way which adjoins the complainant's property.
- (D) In the case of noises emanating from within a multi-family structure and where the complainant is a resident of the same multi-family structure, noise measurements shall be made in the unit of the complainant at the height of at least four feet above the floor and at a point approximately equal distance from all walls.

- (A) No person or group of persons shall operate or cause to be operated a source of sound in excess of sound levels as specified in §92.04 without first obtaining a permit as hereinafter set forth.
- (B) Any person or persons desiring a permit shall apply as provided herein and provide all the information required.
  - (1) A legally responsible person of 18 years or older, must be listed on the permit.
  - (2) An application for a permit pursuant to this subsection shall be submitted to the Chatham County central permitting office at least seven (7) days prior to the event or activity. Upon tentative approval, the applicant for a permit shall be responsible for mailing or otherwise delivering to the occupants of each property within a one-thousand (1000) foot radius of the facility or property for which the permit is being considered, as shown on the tax maps of the County, a notice stating the date and hours of the event. The notice shall be delivered at least seventy-two (72) hours in advance of the event. The permit shall not be granted until the applicant submits an affidavit to central permitting that the notices have actually been mailed or delivered. An application may be accepted with less than seven (7) days' notice provided notice to property owners is achieved within 72 hours of the event.
  - (3) The applicant or applicant's designee shall have the permit present at the event and available for inspection upon request by any law enforcement officer otherwise the permit becomes null and void.
  - (4) The County Manager, or his or her designee, will act expeditiously upon all requests for a permit to exceed maximum permissible sound levels.

- (5) In considering and acting on all requests for permits pursuant to this section, the County Manager, or his or her designee, shall consider the following in issuing or denying the permit: the timeliness of the application; the nature of the requested activity or event; the time of the event, and other activities in the vicinity of the location proposed; the effect of the activity on surrounding areas and/or persons; previous noise ordinance violations or failure to provide any of the provisions in this subsection, if any, of the applicant, and any other relevant information at his or her disposal. Any person aggrieved by a permit decision may seek review by certiorari in the Superior Court of Chatham County.
- (6) Prior to obtaining a permit to exceed maximum permissible sound levels, the applicant will pay to the county an administrative fee of \$50, or the then current fee. The information included in the permit shall include the type of activity, purpose of the event, address of event, date of the event or activity.
- (7) Permit holders shall cooperate with the County Sheriff's office in enforcing this chapter by having the applicant or applicant's designee as indicated on the permit application physically present at the site of the event during the entire time for which a permit has been issued and shall agree to assist the Sheriff in enforcing this chapter. The permit holder shall allow the Sheriff's officer to enter the premises at any time during the prescribed activity in order to assess compliance. Failure of the applicant or designee to be present or to assist the Sheriff as herein prescribed shall be cause for revocation of the permit.

### **§92.08** BURDEN OF PROOF OF NOISE VIOLATIONS.

In any proceeding based upon this chapter, if an exception stated in this chapter would limit an obligation or limit liability, or eliminate an obligation or liability, the person seeking the exception shall have the burden of establishing that the exception applies and that the terms of the exception has been met.

### §92.09 PRESUMPTION IN PROSECUTION FOR NOISE VIOLATIONS.

The complaints of two or more persons who have heard the noise, at least one of whom resides in a different home from the other complaining persons or persons, or the complaint of a duly-authorized law enforcement officer, shall be prima facie evidence that the sound is unreasonably loud and disturbing. Sound emission decibel measurements shall not be required for establishment of a prima facie case. While, complainants are encouraged to contact law enforcement to report an unreasonably loud and disturbing noise prior to swearing out a warrant or other criminal process from a magistrate; they are not required to do so. Prior to appearing before the Magistrate, Hhowever, a verbal or written request asking the offending party to stop the offending noise is required. Any magistrate shall upon hearing convincing evidence under oath of two or more persons who have heard the noise, and not speaking on behalf of another person, shall issue a citation or other enforcement mechanism. A verbal or written request is not required before contacting law enforcement.

### §92.10 ABROGATION.

This chapter is not intended to repeal, abrogate or impair any greater restrictions imposed by, covenants or deed restrictions. Wherever the provisions of any other law, ordinance, or regulation impose higher standards than are required by the provisions of this chapter, the provision of such other law, ordinance or regulation shall govern.

### §92.99 CRIMINAL PENALTY.

Any person who violates any provision of this chapter shall be guilty of a misdemeanor punishable by imprisonment not to exceed 30 days, or a fine not to exceed \$500 in accordance with \$153A-123, or both. Each day of a continuing violation shall constitute a separate offense under this chapter.
