Triangle Innovation Point (TIP) West is an approximately 400 acre site in Moncure at the intersection of Pea Ridge Road and Old US 1. # **Relevant Knowledge and Experience**

The public private partnership between CC Enterprise Park, LLC and Sanford/Lee County was put in place in 2018 and the City and County have not had to make a single interest/lease payment, prior to the building being under contract to be sold.

AUDENTES

The City of Sanford and Lee County agreed to provide annual carry cost in the form of a lease of \$325,000 per year, until the building would be sold or leased. CC Enterprise Park, LLC contributed the financing, design, construction and marketing of the building. On February 18, 2020, it was announced the Building was sold to Audentes Therapeutics as a Gene Therapy Clean Room Manufacturing Facility, providing \$109 million in investment and 209 jobs with an annual average wage of \$83,000. CC Enterprise Park, LLC is moving forward with design of building #2 to continue the program in the industrial park.





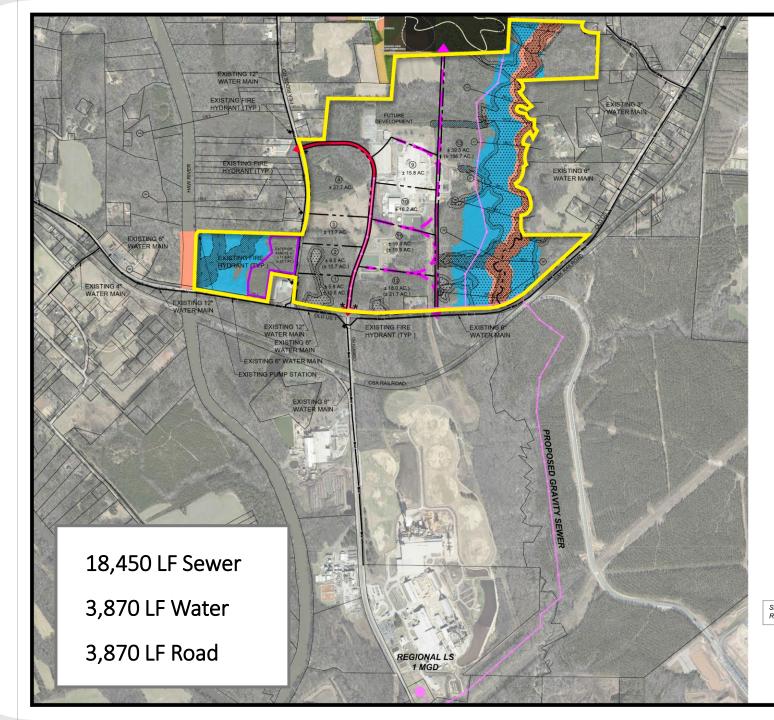

FY21 Housing Trust Fund Guidelines

Action Requested: Approve the updates to the Housing Trust Fund Guidelines for the FY21 cycle

Introduction & Background:

In 2018 the Chatham County Housing Trust Fund (HTF) was created by the Chatham County Board of Commissioners. The fund is intended to provide low interest loans to encourage development projects that preserve or create additional affordable and workforce housing within Chatham County with the overall goals of affirmatively furthering fair housing choice for all residents. The fund may also provide small grants for reimbursement of fees or for studies and other housing related projects in the areas that the county or towns see as a priority for redevelopment.

## **Discussion & Analysis:**

In June 2020, the Chatham County Affordable Housing Advisory Committee passed the latest version of the Housing Trust Fund Guidelines.

The following changes were made in anticipation of the FY21 Application Cycle which opens August 31st:

The 5th priority under the section titled "Housing Trust Fund Priorities" was added to say "*To preserve existing affordable housing through renovation, repair, and retrofitting.*"

The 4th item under the section titled "Eligible Activities" was added and edited to say "Purchase, rehabilitation, or other eligible improvements of existing housing units that are substandard, and/or in need of energy efficiency improvements and/or accessibility modifications.

The 6th under the section titled "Eligible Activities" was edited to include an additional sentence that says "Please note that funding unrelated to the production or preservation of affordable housing is limited".

# Fiscal Year 2021 Policy Guidelines

Chatham County Affordable Housing Advisory Committee Effective: September 18, 2018

Updated: August 17, 2020

The **Chatham County Housing Trust Fund (HTF)** was created in 2018 by the Chatham County Board of Commissioners. The fund is intended to provide low interest loans to encourage development projects that preserve or create additional affordable and workforce housing within Chatham County with the overall goals of affirmatively furthering fair housing choice for all residents. The fund may also provide small grants for reimbursement of fees or for studies and other housing related projects in the areas that the county or towns see as a priority for redevelopment.

# **Housing Trust Fund Priorities**

- 1. To increase the supply of affordable housing near resources like grocery stores, public transportation, schools, jobs, and healthcare.
- 2. To reduce and avoid undue concentrations of poverty and subsidized housing.
- 3. To incentivize development of affordable and workforce housing for low-and moderateincome households
- 4. To promote diversity and vitality of neighborhoods.
- 5. To preserve existing affordable housing through renovation, repair, and retrofitting.

# **Eligible Applicants**

Applicants must have a valid tax identification number, be an organization, agency, state or local government.

# **Eligible Activities**

The Chatham County Housing Trust Fund will financially support proposals that address affordable housing. Examples of possible proposals include but are not limited to the following:

- 1. Construction of new housing for sale or rental, including land acquisition and hard costs.
- 2. Preservation of existing affordable housing, the tax credits for which are getting ready to expire.
- 3. Conversion or adaptive reuse of existing non-residential structures for housing.
- 4. Purchase, rehabilitation, or other eligible improvements of existing housing units that are substandard, and/or in need of energy efficiency improvements and/or accessibility modifications.
- 5. Purchase and rehabilitation or conversion of market rate developments to affordable housing.
- 6. Payment of pre-development costs, such as feasibility studies, appraisals, land options, and preparation of an application. *Please note that funding unrelated to the production or preservation of affordable housing is limited.*

# **Basic Project Selection Criteria**

While a range of activities are eligible, all proposals must contain the following:

- 1. <u>At least</u> 20% of the development must be affordable to households with incomes at or below 120% of the Area Median Income, adjusted for household size.\*
- 2. Comply with the applicable jurisdiction's zoning, land development, and other housing policies.
- 3. Development or program must be within Chatham County.

Chatham County Social Services Director Jennie Kristiansen gave a presentation to the Board. (Presentation attached)

Child fatality means the child is a resident of Chatham County, does not necessarily mean the death occurred in Chatham County.

Chair Howard stated there has been a concern about increase in spousal abuse and lack of access due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Schools are also a place where abuse issues with children are identified. She asked if there is thought around how to bridge the gap we are seeing because kids are not in school. Ms. Kristiansen stated they saw an up tick in domestic violence prior to the COVID-19 pandemic. They began early on to meet as a group. DSS is a subset of the Domestic Violence Task Force. They are checking in about every three weeks to talk about what people are struggling with, where the gaps are, and what is successful. They haven't figured out how to get reports from people who are not being seen. Schools report child abuse and neglect so they haven't figured that out but they are discussing it.

Interim Chatham County Health Director Mike Zelek stated Rob Schooley has been a great resource and connection to the schools and the health department. He thanked Chatham County Schools Superintendent Dr. Derek Jordan and his team as well. Ms. Kristiansen said a real positive they have seen is the community coming together during a different and difficult time. Nonprofits are also communicating a lot and staying connected.

Commissioner Dasher welcomed Mr. Zelek as the Chatham County Interim Health Director.

Chair Howard asked if there is a possible conversation to be had of how youth can use their devices to advocate for themselves or report their circumstances. Ms. Kristiansen said self-reporting is more complicated because most reports are received over the phone. Broadband access is an issue. Foster care visits were virtual for several weeks and it worked really well.

Commissioner Dasher asked if the Chatham County Board of Health is planning on making masks mandatory in businesses like Orange and Durham Counties have recently done. Mr. Zelek stated there is mounting evidence that face coverings do provide benefits. He said if the commissioners would like to make an official request to the Board of Health about masks they would be more than happy to take that up as a discussion item. Chair Howard believes a recommendation from the Board of Health would help.

### **PUBLIC INPUT SESSION**

Mike Pool stated a group of concerned voters reviewed the petition circulated by Franklin Flores to have his name on the ballot as an unaffiliated candidate. Their concern is not with the candidate but the process. Because Chatham County Commissioners are elected at large, any voter in the county could sign his petition. Mr. Flores received the least signatures on the petition from District 5, which is the district Mr. Flores would represent if elected. Mr. Pool said the County should not have voting methods that allow three precincts to decide on the five county commissioners.

Alicia Koblansky submitted the following comments:

Good Evening Commissioner's. My name is Dr. Alicia Koblansky and I am a resident of Chatham County. I was able to attend the remote meetings for the Chatham County Appearance Commission on May 27 and the Planning Board Meeting on June 6, 2020. Both of these meetings used the virtual platform Go to Webinar. The platform is easy to connect to for those residents that have internet, but has limitations in regards to how many panelist are viewable at one time. While this limitation was not an issue for the Appearance Commission, with it's the smaller panel, this was a bigger issue for the Planning Board, in which it was clear that the Planning Board was having a harder time discussing points and not all of the members of the Planning Board could be heard.

As a resident of the community it is important for us to be able to discuss our positions. The current process for development approval has been streamlined solely for approval of proposals but not for optimizing what the community needs. Overall, the process of developing shows prejudice in favor of the developer who is submitting their proposal. This systemic bias is expected, since the Developer has to fund the submission and analyses that have to be provided and invariably relies on members of the community that are better known by the Planning Staff such as lawyers.

In the proposal submission, the developer has to submit evidence of Community Meetings and comments that were made. The Planning Staff and Planning Board, use these documents as a way to measure the community's opinion to a particular proposal. However, these submissions are skewed in the favor of the submitter who has screened those dissenting comments in favor of those that are the easiest to complete.

There is no incentive for Developers to be forthcoming with all of the information from these Community Meetings to the Commissioners, the Planning Board and/or Staff. If a third party arbitrator were involved to document these interactions, this could provide a more fair representation of the Community Meetings.

Without having an arbitrator involved, the residents must communicate directly to the Planning Staff and Planning Board to have their opinions heard. During the current emergency, the Planning Board meetings are only going to be held via "Go To Webinar", with no opportunity to meet in person. Being a specialist in Infectious Diseases, I understand the reasons behind this choice. However, I request that the Staff and Board work to develop additional options to host residents of the community at specific Planning Board meetings just like the Board of Commissioners have decided to run.

In addition, in lieu of having an arbitrator at the Community meetings, I request transcripts and photos from said Community meetings that are taken by residents be included in the Development proposal and distributed to all Planning staff, Planning Board members and Commissioners. These documents should be included in the public records and be evaluated and weighted in the same manner as the Community meeting notes that are provided by the Developer.

During these difficult times, I thank the Commissioner's, Planning Staff and all those involved for moving forward. I understand we are trying to establish a new normal, but maybe we can take this time to make progress toward a new more inclusive process of approvals that allows more appropriate community involvement.

The number of approvals processed in a certain time frame should not measure success. Instead, it should be measured by the community's satisfaction with those developments. Thank you.

Charles Esther addressed the format of remote meetings for the Board of Commissioners meetings. He thanked Clerk Lindsay Ray and County staff for their efforts to make this format possible. The BOC remote/in-person meeting format is not suited for the Planning Board. Residents have been told the remote meeting format follows the NC Open Meeting Law but they feel there should be other considerations such as protecting the health and well-being of residents. Mr. Esther urged the commissioners to wait on hearing and voting on controversial subjects until residents could meet safely in person.

*Emily Moose submitted the following comments on behalf of the Chatham County Planning Board:* 

On June 2, 2020 the Chatham County Planning Board considered updates to the Planning Board Rules of Procedures to incorporate remote meeting guidelines, made necessary by the impacts of COVID-19. Members agreed with updates except for the absence of a requirement to facilitate public input and participation. With current software limitations, speaking at meetings currently requires a smart phone or computer and reliable internet access, known challenges in largely rural Chatham County.

While the public will be able to speak in person with appropriate social distancing measures at BOC meetings if remote attendance is unfeasible, we understand there are resource concerns about providing this option for Planning Board meetings. That said, input during Planning Board meetings is common, valuable, and often significantly informs decisions, deliberations and recommendations to the BOC--especially for controversial items of significant impact on residents. One resident attending this meeting remotely by voice also shared concerns about this. Board discussion also included the availability of wifi outside public buildings, potential participation benefits of remote attendance, options for submitting comments outside of the meeting and general lack of reliable high-speed internet in the county. It was also noted that while Section V. K of the Rules of Procedure encourages public participation, the electronic meetings updates do not guarantee that opportunity.

Ultimately 10 out of 11 board members voted to adopt the updated Rules or Procedures, required for the Planning Board to hold any future meetings. One member voted against the proposed updates because of the potential to exclude people without a reliable internet connection or a device, asking that alternate arrangements be available if needed. As concerns about public participation options are also shared by the majority, this statement includes both minority and majority views. Although the majority of the Board voted in favor of adopting the provisions governing electronic meetings for the reason that we would not be allowed to hold electronic meetings in the future without such approval, all Board members are concerned that those provisions are inadequate for meeting our responsibilities to the ordinance that established the Planning Board. The ordinance requires that we do all that we can to facilitate, consider and honor public input into our recommendations and that we communicate to all interested citizens the reasons for our recommendations to the board of Commissioners. The Planning Board has a duty to receive public hearing input, per county ordinance, for some development proposals, and we greatly benefit in our deliberations from that input directly.

Recognizing the significant efforts that Staff have made in this already, and

appreciating your efforts to adapt to this challenging situation, we respectfully and urgently ask that you find technological or logistical alternatives that ensure equitable opportunity to participate in government, and ensure the Planning Board has the benefit in our deliberations of hearing from everyone who wants to be heard.

Gene Galin, Planning Board member, encouraged the Board of Commissioners to find a way for the Planning Board to take advantage of the same remote/in-person hybrid meeting format of the BOC by providing staff and resources.

Sharon Garbutt submitted the following comments:

### Commissioners,

I wanted to make several comments regarding the proposed "The Conservancy at Jordan Lake" subdivision.

• It is my understanding that the original proposal was for 47 lots with public water, but due to the expense of providing public water the proposal was amended to 45 lots with individual wells. This seems like a lot of wells for a 105 acre development and it seems that problems could arise with both water quantity and water quality.

• The quality of the groundwater on this property is unknown, but questions have been raised about the groundwater quality in the Moncure area because of the industries located there and because of its proximity to the Brickhaven coal ash landfill where groundwater contamination is suspected. Dr. Andrew George of the UNC School of Public Health is currently having groundwater samples from the Moncure area analyzed for contaminants.

• The developer held the community meeting when the proposal was for 47 lots with public water. During that meeting residents asked if this development would make public water available to their property. Their interest in obtaining public water suggests that current residents may be dissatisfied with their wells. Have any Planning Dept. staff, Planning Board members or BOC members asked area residents why they are interested in public water? Has the developer or anyone on the Planning Board or BOC spoken with adjoining residents about the revised plan that will not provide public water and will instead add 45 wells on land directly adjoining their property? The existing residents may feel this large number of wells will jeopardize their own water supply and water quality.

• According to the Plan Chatham Future Land Use and Conservation Plan Map, this development is in an area designated as Rural and Agricultural. This development does not meet the recommended four acre lot size for an area designated as Rural and Agricultural and therefore is inconsistent with the 2017 Plan Chatham document. The County spent a lot of money and a lot of volunteer citizens donated a lot of their time and a tremendous number of Chatham citizens gave their input to this plan. It seems that the Plan Chatham document should be adhered to since it is what Chatham citizens asked for, worked for and paid for!

Until these issues are addressed, I am asking the Board of Commissioners to delay a vote on whether to approve this subdivision. Thank you for your consideration.

Chatham County Planner Kimberly Tyson reviewed the specifics of the request.

Vice Chair Hales stated she has concerns about the proposed 45 wells on the property and well testing. She is concerned about wells with vanadium, hexavalent chromium, manganese and other compounds. She called Andrew George at UNC about the work they have done in Chatham County. Their work showed that 83% percent of the wells tested in Chatham County showed vanadium levels above the state limit. She questions what the cap should be on wells. She did not have a problem with the development when it came to the Board in February and the developer was to use public water. She feels moving to 45 wells is a significant change in the plan. She stated Andrew George is 100% supportive of the County requiring more tests. She is concerned because the area for this project has contamination. The County is not testing for these heavy metals. Residents have to pay \$150 more for a well test for hexavalent chromium. Public water is a known quantity but wells are not. She is concerned individuals who want to purchase property in this area will not be informed of the possible contamination of well water. She asked if there are any comments from the developer about the preference for private wells over County water.

Mark Ashness spoke on behalf of the applicant. In the initial discussions with the County Utilities Director Larry Bridges, he felt the project could be served with County water. Later Mr. Bridges determined that the because the project is at the end of the County water line where Triangle Brick is located, he had concerns about being able to provide adequate water supply and pressure to the project. That necessitated the applicant coming back with a modification to the project where they dropped two lots in favor of going with individual wells. The applicant also owns the land adjacent to the project and he has tested a well on that property and the results showed that well had ten gallons per minute and NW Pool, a reputable well driller in the area, said there were no issues they saw. The manganese is high, but that is typical. Manganese is not regulated as a health issue but more of a color and turbidity issue. There are a lot of systems available today to treat that. This is not just a Chatham County issue. The applicant is also the developer of the Carolina Crossings project, which is near the Apex Nurseries on Hwy 751 near the Martha's Chapel Rd. intersection. That development also has individual wells. His plan is to bring in the same type of custom home builders of that development for this project. These will be fairly expensive homes and these types of homes can accommodate the types of treatment systems being discussed to ensure the water quality is good. The applicant feels this type of subdivision will be an asset to the Moncure area. They recognize that there are ground water issues in North Carolina and Chatham County but they want to be treated like every other subdivision the County has considered in the past and in the future. The applicant has met every aspect of the requirements of the subdivision ordinance and Planning staff can confirm that. The applicant will be happy to disclose information about the private airstrip to the north of the project. They would also be happy to disclose information from the Virginia Tech study. Mr. Ashness does not feel like 45 lots has a big effect on the groundwater table. It is a recycled system. Mr. Ashness believes the applicant is in full compliance with the ordinance in place. They would prefer a favorable decision from the Board of Commissioners this evening.

Vice Chair Hales agreed that the applicant is in compliance with the subdivision ordinance. Her question is a one of warning. The people who buy in this subdivision will more than likely not already be Chatham County residents. These residents could put in home filtration systems but would they know they should? Vice Chair Hales asked the County Attorney if a warning statement could be included on the plat about a possibility of heavy metal contamination of wells and a recommendation of wells to be tested for a suite of heavy metals. She believes this should be information available to the future homeowner.

Commissioner Dasher asked if this would be exclusively for wells in southeast Chatham County. Vice Chair Hales said that is possible. She will be making a recommendation to have the Environmental Review Advisory Committee take a look at the subdivision ordinance as well as water testing that the Board may want to require for subdivisions with a certain number of wells. Commissioner Dasher if the Moncure area was the only area of the county tested. Vice Chair Hales stated there were wells tested north of Hwy 64. The full GIS mapping of the testing is not yet available. She does not think the study included wells in the western part of the county.

Vice Chair Hales asked the county attorney if anything can be placed on the plat. County Attorney Jep Rose said the subdivision regulations would have to be amended to require specific information be required on the plat. The County Attorney stated the Board of Commissioners cannot change the rules for this particular subdivision. Mr. Ashness said the applicant wishes to be treated as fairly as all other applicants in the county.

Chair Howard asked about the significant change in the Planning Board vote on this project. Planning Board Chair Dr. George Lucier said the original vote of the Planning Board for the initial request was a unanimous vote in favor of the request. The Planning Board vote on the modification of the plan was a six to five vote and the major concern was the water quality in the area. They also discussed a concern of the Agriculture Advisory Board about wells in the county. Chair Howard asked for clarity on the position of the County Utilities department that pressure for Triangle Brick could be impacted. County Manager Dan LaMontagne said the cost would be on the developer to provide county water to the project due to the current state of the line. Mr. Ashness believes this is more of a timing issue. The reality is there will be other options for water in the future because of future projects but at this moment in time the applicant is comfortable that individual wells will satisfy this project for the foreseeable future until that time comes and then they will see what happens. Chair Howard stated the Board needs to be concerned that it doesn't adversely affect the area around it. Mr. Ashness stated most of the property adjacent to the project is in timber management.

Vice Chair Hales thinks this is the appropriate time to review the subdivision ordinance. She believes the planning department and the Environmental Review Advisory Committee should look at what level of well testing the County may want to require for subdivisions as part of the ordinance. The state has its minimums but we already know we have conditions on the ground in Chatham County.

Commissioner Dasher said his concern is that an applicant has done what they are supposed to do based on the regulations and it would not be right for the Board to deny the request. Vice Chair Hales said she will definitely vote to deny the request. She will request that prior to the approval of the Unified Development Ordinance, the Planning staff, Planning Board and Environmental Review Advisory Committee evaluate the current subdivision regulations and address well testing, especially for the heavy metals, and how that might relate to the County subdivision ordinance and should there be changes.

A motion was made by Vice Chair Hales, seconded by Commissioner Dasher, to direct Planning staff, the Planning Board and the Environmental Review Advisory Committee evaluate the current subdivision regulations and address well testing, especially testing for the heavy metals, and how that may relate to the County subdivision ordinance and discern if the subdivision regulations need changes. Commissioner Dasher participated in the latest TARPO meeting and NCDOT is facing significant shortfalls due to the pandemic. Mowing is probably one of the items that will not be a priority during this time.

Commissioner Wilkie thanked County staff and everyone at the Agriculture and Conference Center for making the Board of Commissioner meetings possible during the pandemic.

Chair Howard also said that NCDOT is experiencing shortfalls and has begun furloughing employees.

Chair Howard collaborated with NC Representative Robert Reives, NC Senator Valerie Foushee, and Chatham County School Board Member Del Turner on a community response to the current situation in our nation. The statement reads:

A Chatham Community Response

These have been difficult days for many in our community, as we deal with the ongoing devastating effects of COVID-19 and the raw exposure of racism that continues to undermine our society. Let us make no mistake; the two tragedies are inextricably linked and the time has come to face the ugly truth of these salient "viruses" in America and their far-reaching effects.

We are just a little over two weeks since the nation witnessed the barbaric murder of George Floyd, five weeks since the video of Ahmad Arbery's killing went viral, three months since the death of Breonna Taylor, five and a half years since the slaying of 12 -year-old Timir Rice, six years since the killing of Eric Garner and over eight years since the slaughter of Trayvon Martin.

Those are a handful of the many lives lost; Amadou Diallo, Sandra Bland, Michael Brown, Philando Castile, Alton Sterling, Walter Scott...the list is infinite.

For many people of color, the pain of recent weeks has been deeply personal, but not

new. We have felt this fear, this hopelessness and this heartbreak before. The question is, what will we do now that so many of our allies are feeling it too?

### PUBLIC INPUT SESSION

Laura Bradley submitted the following comments:

Good afternoon Commissioners. Thank you for allowing me to speak to you today. My name is Laura Bradley, and I am a resident of Chatham County. I am here today to give input as to the Commissioner's upcoming decision on scheduling the backlog of public hearings.

In a state of emergency, it is critical that resource allocation be carefully monitored, prioritizing decisions based on what is most vital to the community at that time. We must efficiently conserve resources that are now in even greater demand.

Quite simply, the application for Williams Corner is not one that should be a top priority for the county right now because there are known deficiencies and items that have not been sufficiently addressed in the proposal. Moving forward at this time is not a judicious use of anyone's time and resources: the County officials, volunteer advisory committees, or the community at large.

The Environmental Review Advisory Committee has noted that there are multiple areas in the EIA still needing to be addressed - so many that they have asked the developer to appear before them again. Likewise, the planning staff has noted that the proposal does not adequately address wastewater issues. In fact, wastewater management appears to hinge on matters that will not be heard by the Utilities Commission until September, and are then almost certain to be legally challenged. The developer has attempted to have his cake and eat it too by vaguely referencing on-site wastewater management, but here again, there are no specifics that would allow for meaningful discussion and evaluation. On-site wastewater management would be a significant alteration to the site plan - triggering the need for resubmittal. And given the economic changes since the plan was submitted seven months ago, any economic data provided in January is now woefully outdated and virtually useless.

If the developer wants his proposal to be approved, the burden is on him to put forth all the information needed to adequately assess it. We should not have to do his job for him. Moving forward on Williams Corner is not fair to anyone else on the agenda who did do their due diligence.

Given the magnitude of this proposal, it is absolutely critical that the Williams Corner public hearing be conducted at a time when all the facts are available and staff, Commissioners, and the community at large will have ample time to both evaluate the facts and debate this precedent setting proposal. We cannot rush through this process. Please be mindful of this as you are making decisions on future agendas tonight. Please require the developer to provide all needed information before scheduling a public hearing. Thank you for your time.

Chris Ehrenfeld submitted the following comments:

Dear Commissioners:

As a dedicated member of the Chatham County community, Williams Corner means a great deal to me personally. This project has undoubtedly caused a divide among neighboring residents as it is the first major project that brings life to the Comprehensive Land Use Plan. As we have learned through recent events and movements, the only way we can make progress and move forward is to do what is right, even if everyone does not agree. We are not going to solve the inequality of our current housing market, or access to things like good schools and quality health care through continued single family residential sprawl. With Williams Corner, we have an opportunity to fund our schools, create jobs, improve our roads, reduce the affordable housing gap and breath life into a Comp Plan that so many dedicated so much time to create.

The next step is for the Williams Corner public hearing to occur. The pandemic has obviously shifted how we all function on a daily basis. Pre-Covid, very few of us used video conferencing. Now, everybody uses video conferencing for communication. It only makes sense that we are handling government meetings in a similar fashion. I have participated in several of the County's Go-To-Webinar meetings. There have been challenges but staff has done an excellent job of navigating those challenges. I think the system you now have in place is a great way to move forward.

As you decide when you will be hearing the backlog of projects, I feel it is fair that the Williams Corner public hearings be given top priority over any other legislative public hearings that were applied-for after Williams Corner. Williams Corner has been on file since January, longer than any other pending planning matter, and there were no other legislative public hearing applications filed that month. It seems reasonable, fair and prudent that the Williams Corner public hearings should not be delayed, even another day, in favor of hearings on applications that were filed after ours. Together, we can make progress and positive change to our community.

Julie Esther submitted the following comments:

Good afternoon, Commissioners,

I am speaking today as a Chatham county citizen to ask that you reconsider the plan to schedule the Williams Corner public hearing on August 17th. I am requesting this due to the news that multiple other hearings are also scheduled for the August meeting, including quasi-judicial hearings that will take priority over the Williams Corner hearing.

Chatham county staff have gone to great lengths to develop a remote format for county meetings. While this allows meetings to continue to move forward, it is important to take into consideration when planning the agenda for remote meetings that this virtual format makes conducting the business of the meetings more tedious and time-consuming. During every remote county meeting I have attended, the meeting has had to be stopped multiple times to address technical problems or provide technical guidance to a participant who is having difficulty. To be clear, this is through no fault of county staff. This is simply the reality of holding meetings remotely.

County staff have known since January that the Williams Corner public hearing was going to be long, given the need to accommodate considerable public input. In fact, staff even took the unusual step of scheduling the public hearing at the Agriculture Center due to the large number of people expected to attend. Given this level of public interest, it does not make sense for the Commissioners to hold a public hearing on Williams Corner on the same night as another hearing. Even simple agenda items take longer than normal due to the remote format, meaning the Williams Corner hearing may be pushed late into the night. Scheduling the Williams Corner hearing in this way, especially during a pandemic, risks sending the message to the public that the County is trying to minimize public participation in the Williams Corner hearing.

I have been told that the Commissioners may consider scheduling additional meetings to provide sufficient time to discuss each proposal while still allowing the county to address a backlog of agenda items. While understandable, I would urge caution. Sending a large number of items through the Board of Commissioners in a short period of time may create problems for the Planning Board. The Planning Board is the primary forum in which details of a proposal can be considered in depth. However, because the Planning Board is not allowed to meet in person due to pandemic restrictions and must meet entirely virtually, they are having even more trouble than the Commissioners with the efficiency of remote meetings. Since the Planning Board is legally limited to no more than three meetings once a proposal has cleared the Board of Commissioners, it seems difficult to see how they could give Williams Corner the attention it requires if they must also review a large number of other proposals. Such a plan could give the community the impression that the Commissioners are trying to push through a controversial project without due consideration.

Because the Williams Corner proposal is so complex, problematic, and highly opposed, it is critical that the public hearing and Planning Board meetings are planned carefully. I respectfully request that you schedule the Williams Corner public hearing for a time that facilitates public input, rather than hindering it. Thank you.

### **PUBLIC INPUT SESSION**

Alicia Koblansky submitted the following comments:

Good evening Commissioners. My name is Alicia Koblansky, I am a resident of Chatham County and tonight I am speaking not just for myself but on behalf of the residents of Wilder Ridge and Lystra Estates.

We understand that due to the unprecedent events that we are all living through, the Board is dealing with a backlog of public hearings. These public hearings include the 919 Storage, LLC Rezoning, Williams Corner rezoning and text amendments for Williams Corner and Vickers Bennett. All these rezoning and text amendments are within a 3-mile stretch on the 15-501 corridor, in the northeastern corner of Chatham county. All these proposals will affect the same residents and communities, not to mention the thousands of other residents that use this corridor to travel. It will be important to allow the community to have ample time to speak at each of these public hearings and it is unclear if this will occur if these are rushed through to clear a backlog.

At this time there is a petition that has almost one thousand signatures from the surrounding communities who have signed their opposition rezoning of Williams Corner due to its poorly developed plans.

The text amendments for Williams Corner and Vickers Bennett are worrisome as they will change the character of the county by increasing densities to be like major urban centers and contribute to far greater problems than any of the impact assessments can possible account for. The Developers, with these new text amendments, are hoping to force your hands on the new policies to be included in Chatham County's Unified Development Ordinance. The developers should not have power over this new UDO. This should be solely a discussion between the community and the commissioners

Condensing these topics into 1 or 2 meetings will preclude involvement by the community. Other townships and counties who have hosted a public hearing with a controversial topic on a virtual platform have seen their meeting last 4-5 hours with an additional public meeting to allow the community the opportunity to voice their opinion and have it place on public record.

As a Chatham County resident, we only have two opportunities to have our comments heard by the Commissioners and recorded into public record. Since all 5 proposals will redundantly affect many in these communities, it will be important to allow these same residents the opportunity to speak for each item separately. Without addressing this sufficiently, it will lead to a lack of participation from the community, which will undoubtedly subvert the public support required to move forward with any of the meeting items.

These are big, community changing projects that will have a lasting impact on neighborhoods that have existed for decades. We need to ensure that enough time and oversight is given to each of these proposals to find that right balance for development and the character of Chatham county. Otherwise our "Gateway to Chatham County" becomes a sprawling mess that looks no different than Western Blvd in Raleigh.

Beyond the need to include the public in these public hearings, we need to provide the Planning Board ample opportunity to appropriately review and consider each of these proposals. Due to the impact and scope of these proposals we ask the Commissioners to allow more time for the Planning Board to carefully review these documents. These are volunteers doing their civic duty and giving up their personal time to help our community develop. It is unfair to ask more of them than is being asked of those that stand to profit from these submission. Precedence must be set for these larger developments. These are not simply building a dozen houses. These developers are asking that you change policy, so let's do just that, and work towards a solution that will not cripple the established communities and a UDO that will be structured to support those existing here now.

I thank you for your time and consideration. I know these are stressful times but if we remember what is important, we will more forward and I believe be a stronger Chatham. Thank you

Valerie Broadway spoke to the Board about homelessness in Chatham County. When a foster child turns 18 the foster parent has no obligation to continue to provide housing or care for them. As a result many find themselves homeless. There are few options for these children and all others who are homeless in Chatham County. Because of a lack of affordable housing, people transitioning out of homelessness can't find a place to live. She believes the rapid re-housing program with The Salvation Army has only helped one couple. She asked why Chatham County doesn't have a homeless shelter. She asked what the plan for funding is for the rapid re-housing program.

Charles Esther submitted the following comments:

Dear Chatham County Commissioners, I am speaking as a citizen of Chatham County with regards to planning for the public hearing on the Williams Corner proposal. My understanding is that you are considering scheduling this hearing for the August 17th meeting that will also include multiple other quasi-judicial and public hearings, some of which will of necessity be discussed prior to Williams Corner.

As you may recall, I have come before you on multiple previous occasions advocating that the Williams Corner proposal be delayed until we can once again hold large group meetings in person. I still believe this to be the best option, since I have been told repeatedly that the best way for the public to register opposition to a proposal is to show up in large numbers to the Commissioner's meeting, which is currently impossible under pandemic restrictions. However, I also understand that there is considerable uncertainly about when we will be able to have normal meetings again, and the county does not want to delay proposals indefinitely.

Therefore, what I am asking of you today is time. Time to discuss Williams Corner in the detail the proposal deserves. This proposal is unprecedented in many ways, including utilization of a relatively untested zoning ordinance, the residential density of the development, and reliance on offsite wastewater. As concerned adjacent homeowners, my neighbors and I have reviewed the proposal in detail and uncovered numerous problems and concerns. Plan Chatham is misrepresented. The traffic plan is misleading. The market analysis is incomplete, and likely obsolete given the changes in post-pandemic economic realities. The environmental assessment is woefully inadequate, as was obvious during the recent ERAC meeting. I could go on, but I don't have the time.

What my neighbors and I want is assurance from the Commissioners that the public will have adequate time during the public hearing to bring the many problems with the proposal to your attention. This cannot happen if the hearing on Williams Corner is worked into a packed August agenda. Furthermore, as a physician I am concerned that such a plan would require a long meeting in an enclosed space with a large number of speakers. Even with safety measures, that set of circumstances increases the risk of COVID-19 transmission, a risk that will be borne most heavily by the Commissioners and staff.

To conclude, my first preference is still to delay this proposal until circumstances change sufficiently to allow us to have public hearing in person. Failing that, I implore the Commissioners to develop an agenda that will allow the public sufficient time to address all of the concerns. Thank you.

She also participated in a racial justice meeting with our judicial district. There were 150 plus participants on the call and it was a worthwhile meeting.

Commissioner Dasher stated the Town of Pittsboro has hired Chris Kennedy as Town Manager and he worked with him a little on the TARPO board and is happy for the Town. He stated he is also getting a lot of questions about the County's progress on its broadband efforts and asked if there was any updates staff could provide to the public. Mr. LaMontagne stated the County is working on vertical assets with the radio towers that will be built. The County is in negotiations right now on other efforts so he is not certain how much can be discussed in the public at this time but he will speak with the MIS Director to see if there is any information that can be provided to the public.

Commissioner Wilkie stated the Goldston Old Fashioned Day is still scheduled for October. The Silk Hope Old Fashioned Farmer's Day is still scheduled for Labor Day weekend. Both events are monitoring the COVID-19 situation and Governor's Orders.

Chair Howard stated there have been wonderful conversations on racial justice and equity in the local court system. She participated in a listening session where they heard from local agencies (Public Defenders Office, District Attorneys Office, etc.) and also participated in a larger conversation with other members of the community. She is very encouraged by the conversations taking place.

### **CHATHAM COUNTY**

THIS LEASE AGREEMENT (this "Lease "), made and entered into this \_\_\_\_\_ day of \_\_\_\_\_, 2020 by and between Goldston Rural Fire Department, Inc. ("Lessor") whose mailing address for notices is Post Office Box 432, Goldston, North Carolina, 27252 and Chatham County, a body corporate and politic of the State of North Carolina ("Lessee" or "County") whose mailing address for notices is Post Office Box 1809, Pittsboro, N011h Carolina 27312;

### WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, County has requested that Lessor lease to County real property (hereinafter described) so that County may use the same for an emergency operations tower; and

WHEREAS, Lessor has agreed to lease the said real estate to County;

**NOW, THEREFORE,** in consideration of the foregoing and the mutual agreements herein set forth, the parties agree as follows:

- I. <u>PREMISES</u>. Lessor hereby leases and lets unto County and County hereby takes and hires from Lessor upon and subject to the terms, conditions, covenants, and provisions here of, a certain parcel of real estate located in Goldston, North Carolina, more particularly described as a 60' x 60' fenced tower and equipment compound and driveway and access utility easement as shown on Appendix 1, attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference (hereinafter the "Premises"). In addition County shall have the right of ingress egress, and regress to the Premises across the adjoining property of Lessor, at the location currently being used by the County to access the Premises, which location is subject to change by Lessor from time to time, provided the new location provides equivalent access and is acceptable to the County. The Premises shall be used by Chatham County Emergency Management as a communications tower.
- <u>TERM.</u> The term of this Lease will commence on the \_\_\_\_\_ day of \_\_\_\_\_.
   2020 (the "Commencement Date ") and shall exist and continue for a term of forty (40) years unless terminated as hereinafter provided.
- 3. <u>RENT</u>. County shall pay Lessor rent of \$1.00 per year, or \$40.00 for the term, payable on or before the Commencement Date.
- 4. <u>TAXES</u>. Lessor shall pay all real estate taxes and assessment levied or assessed upon the leased Premises.
- 5. <u>IMPROVEMENTS</u>. It is understood and agreed that County has erected a tower, and may erect, install, construct, rebuild, maintain, operate, inspect, repair, improve, and replace such tower or other structures or appurtenances in connection with establishing, operating, and maintaining such communications systems as County shall deem necessary or appropriate in the conduct of its business upon the Premises. The tower shall be and remain the sole property of County and, at the option of County, may be removed from the Premises at any

time while this Lease is in effect. In addition, the County agrees that it will remove the tower from the Premises within twelve (12) months after the expiration of the term. Lessor shall have no liability for the acts or omissions of the County and its agents, successors, and assigns associated with the tower whether occurring during the term or after its expiration, and County shall indemnify and hold Lessor harmless from said acts of County causing liability

- 6. <u>ACCESS</u>. In addition to the access set out in paragraph 1, Lessor shall furnish County with vehicular access from the public road to the Premises during the term of this Lease. It is expressly understood that if the road now available for vehicular access to the property shall be altered or closed, then another means for vehicular access to said premises shall be constructed at no cost to the County over and across other lands of Lessor. The County shall have the right to secure the Premises with fencing, gates, locks, or other means. The County shall maintain the road providing access to the Premises to the standard required for its vehicles.
- 7. <u>THIRD PARTY DAMAGES</u>. Lessor shall not be liable for any damages to third parties caused as a result of County's use of said Premises, or that of its agents, successors, and assigns, and County shall hold Lessor harmless from such claims resulting from the County's negligence during the term and until the tower is removed, if the County elects to remove the tower.
- 8. <u>OTHER USES</u>. It is agreed that Lessor shall have the right to use the Premises for pasture or other uses as long as the same does not interfere with County's use of the Premises.
- 9. <u>EASEMENT</u>. It is understood and agreed that upon the request of the County, Lessor shall execute an easement for purposes of an electric utility transmission line to the Premises over and across other property of Lessor's

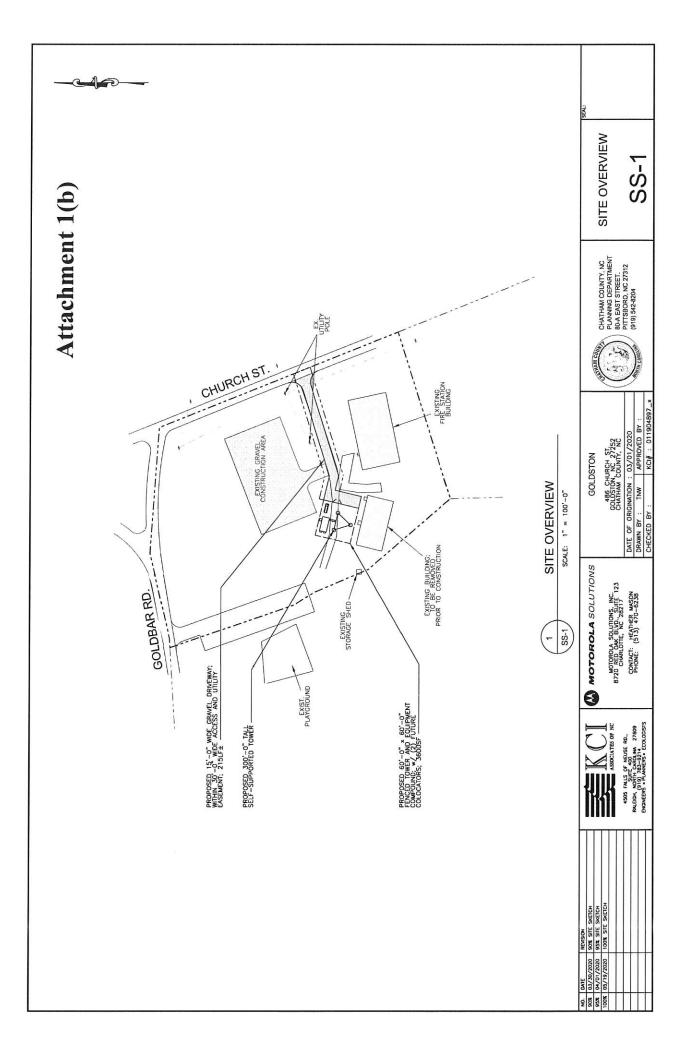

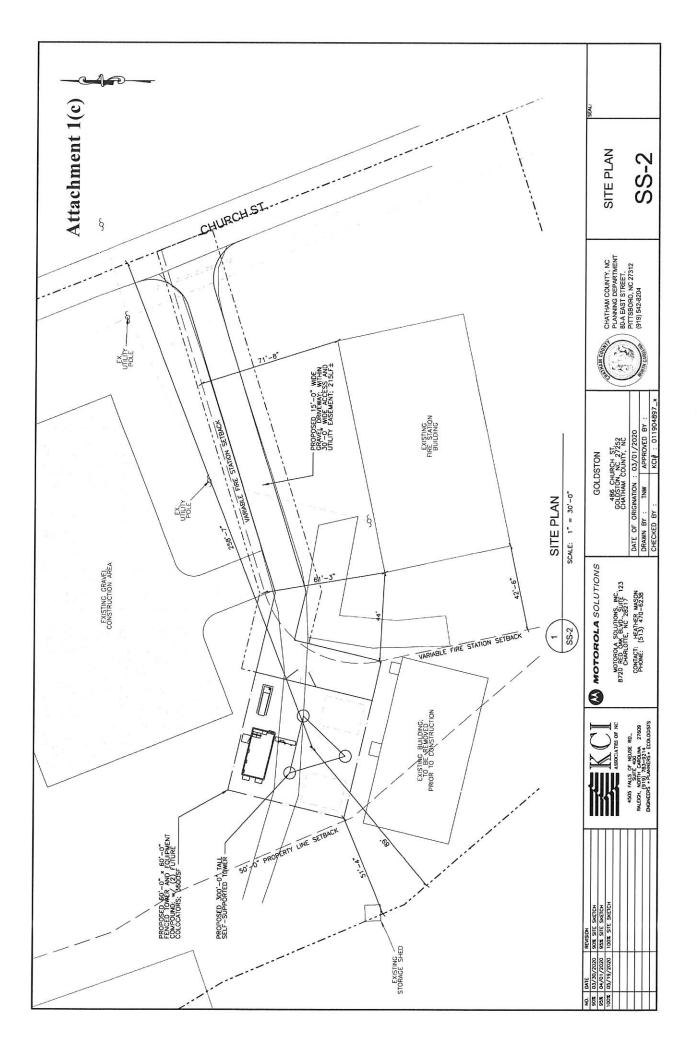

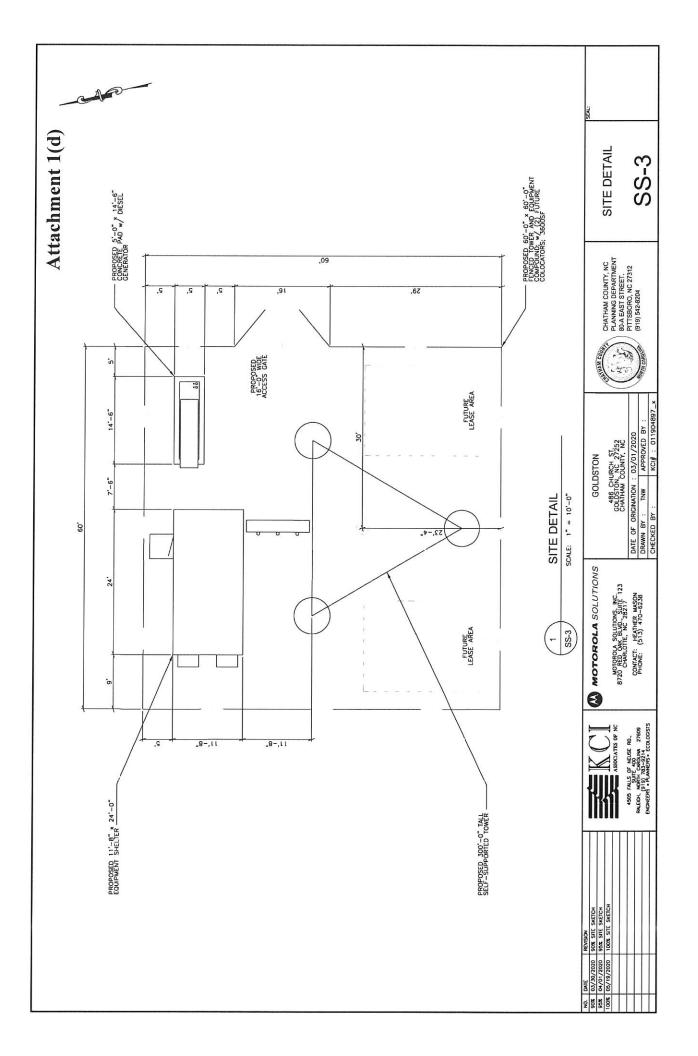

That the Party of the First Part shall commence work to be performed under this agreement on a date to be specified in a written order of the Party of the Second Part and shall fully complete all work hereunder within 180 consecutive calendar days from said date. For each day in excess thereof, liquidated damages shall be as stated in the Project Specifications and General Conditions. The Second Party may elect to reduce retainage requirements after 50 percent of the work has been satisfactorily completed on schedule.

5. #### II. <u>Purpose</u>:

This Activity is for the Local Health Department to work to prevent, prepare for, and respond to Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19) by carrying out surveillance, epidemiology, laboratory capacity, infection control, mitigation, communications, and other preparedness and response activities.

#### III. Scope of Work and Deliverables:

All of the activities the Local Health Department performs under this Agreement Addendum shall be informed by the NC DHHS COVID-19 Guidance for Health Care Providers and Local Health Departments.<sup>1</sup> The Local Health Department (LHD) shall identify and address one or more of the allowable activities from the list of five activities below, with an emphasis on testing and tracing:

# 1. <u>Testing and Tracing</u>: Establish or enhance ability to aggressively identify cases, conduct contact tracing and follow up, as well as implement recommended containment measures.

a. Enhanced testing and contact tracing including contact elicitation/identification, contact notification, and contact follow-up. Activities could include traditional contact tracing methods as well as healthcare-specific and other proximity/location-based methods.

#### 2. <u>Surveillance</u>: Improve morbidity and mortality surveillance, including:

- a. Establish or enhance community-based surveillance i.e., surveillance of populations and individuals without severe illness, travel to high-risk locations, or contacts to known cases.
- b. Provide accurate accounting of COVID-19 associated deaths. Maintain electronic death reporting using the North Carolina Electronic Disease Surveillance System (NCEDSS).

#### 3. <u>Lab Capacity</u>: Enhance laboratory testing and reporting capacity:

a. Establish or expand capacity to test all symptomatic individuals, and secondarily expand capacity to achieve community-based surveillance.

# 4. <u>Infection Control</u>: Prevent and control COVID-19 in healthcare settings and protect other vulnerable or high-risk populations:

- a. Assess and monitor infections in healthcare workers across the healthcare spectrum.
- b. Monitor and help implement mitigation strategies for COVID-19 in all high-risk healthcare facilities (e.g., hospitals, dialysis clinics, cancer clinics, nursing homes, other long-term care facilities).
- c. Monitor and help implement mitigation strategies for other high-risk employment settings (e.g., meat processing facilities), and congregate living settings (e.g., prisons, youth homes, shelters).

# 5. <u>Community Risk Assessment</u>: Improve understanding of jurisdictional communities with respect to COVID-19 risk:

a. Build understanding of population density and high-risk population density (i.e., population of >65 years, proportion of population with underlying conditions, households with limited English fluency, healthcare seeking behavior, populations without insurance and below poverty level).

#### IV. <u>Performance Measures/Reporting Requirements</u>:

#### 1. Performance Measures

- a. Performance Measure # 1: The LHD shall have a policy to ensure access to COVID-19 testing for all symptomatic persons and for those who have had close contact to a known or suspected case of COVID-19 as defined by the CDC, and for those who request or require testing.
   Reporting Requirements: An electronic copy of this testing policy shall be provided to the Regional Communicable Disease Nurse Consultant no later than September 1, 2020.
- b. Performance Measure # 2: The LHD shall report cases of COVID-19 including deaths within 30 days of receipt of the report to the state disease registrar via the NC EDSS.

Reporting Requirements: Reporting will be done via the NC EDSS.

c. Performance Measure # 3: The LHD shall report COVID-19 activity (decline, no change, and increase) in high-risk healthcare facilities (e.g., nursing homes, dialysis centers, long-term care facilities) and congregate living settings (e.g., prisons, youth homes, shelters) via the NCEDSS outbreak module and the CD Outbreak Worksheet within 2 days of receipt of outbreak.
Reporting Requirements: Reporting will be dependent to NCEDSS on dependent to the NCEDSS of the

d. **Performance Measure #4**: The LHD shall report close contacts to COVID-19 into the COVID-19 Community Team Outreach (CCTO) Tool software for at least 60% of people infected with COVID-19.

e. **Performance Measure #5:** The LHD shall complete the Final Monitoring Outcome variable for 90% of contacts entered after 14 days.

Reporting Requirements: Reporting will be done via the CCTO tool software.

#### 2. Additional Reporting Requirements

a. The LHD shall submit Annual Reports to include progress of work performed against each of the allowable activities and performance measures, data (numbers tested/traced to during reporting period), as well as use of funds and programmatic reporting to the CDB at the following intervals:

FY19-20 (January–May 2020) report due no later than August 15, 2020 FY 20-21 (June 2020–May 2021) report due no later than June 15, 2021

- b. Provide data, plans, and documents as requested by CDB that supports reporting the performance measures and deliverables from the ELC CARES grant. Plans and other documents must be consistent with state and federal requirements and must be specific to the LHD's local public health jurisdiction.
- c. The LHD will submit an annual report via Survey Monkey which will include the reporting of work performed against each of the allowable activities and performance measures, data (numbers tested and numbers of contacts traced during the reporting period), reporting on the use of funds, and programmatic reporting. The Survey Monkey survey link will be sent to the LHD by CDB no later than June 15, 2021.

#### V. <u>Performance Monitoring and Quality Assurance</u>:

1. The TATP Nurse Consultant will assess the Local Health Department's performance through reporting mechanisms within the NC EDSS. These reports will be run on a quarterly basis by the TATP Nurse Consultant.

2. If the assessment results in compliance concerns, the TATP Nurse Consultant shall conduct conference calls with the Local Health Department to provide technical assistance in order to rectify the concerns.

#### VI. <u>Funding Guidelines or Restrictions</u>:

- 1. Requirements for pass-through entities: In compliance with 2 CFR §200.331 Requirements for pass-through entities, the Division of Public Health provides Federal Award Reporting Supplements to the Local Health Department receiving federally funded Agreement Addenda.
  - a. Definition: A Supplement discloses the required elements of a single federal award. Supplements address elements of federal funding sources only; state funding elements will not be included in the Supplement. Agreement Addenda (AAs) funded by more than one federal award will receive a disclosure Supplement for each federal award.
  - b. Frequency: Supplements will be generated as the Division of Public Health receives information for federal grants. Supplements will be issued to the Local Health Department throughout the state fiscal year. For federally funded AAs, Supplements will accompany the original AA. If AAs are revised and if the revision affects federal funds, the AA Revisions will include Supplements. Supplements can also be sent to the Local Health Department even if no change is needed to the AA. In those instances, the Supplements will be sent to provide newly received federal grant information for funds already allocated in the existing AA.
- 2. Expenses related to allowable activities may be reimbursed retroactively to January 20, 2020.
- 3. As the Local Health Department is a subrecipient of a grant or cooperative agreement awarded by the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) with funds made available under the Coronavirus Preparedness and Response Supplemental Appropriations Act, 2020 (P.L. 116-123); the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act, 2020 (the "CARES Act") (P.L. 116-136); and/or the Paycheck Protection Program and Health Care Enhancement Act (P.L. 116-139) the LHD agrees as applicable to the award, to:
  - a. comply with existing and/or future directives and guidance from the HHS Secretary regarding control of the spread of COVID-19;
  - b. in consultation and coordination with HHS, provide, commensurate with the condition of the individual, COVID-19 patient care regardless of the individual's home jurisdiction and/or appropriate public health measures (e.g., social distancing, home isolation); and
  - c. assist the United States Government in the implementation and enforcement of federal orders related to quarantine and isolation. In addition, to the extent applicable, Recipient will comply with Section 18115 of the CARES Act, with respect to the reporting to the HHS Secretary of results of tests intended to detect SARS-CoV-2 or to diagnose a possible case of COVID-19. Such reporting shall be in accordance with guidance and direction from HHS and/or CDC.
  - d. consistent with the full scope of applicable grant regulations (45 C.F.R. 75.322), the purpose of this award, and the underlying funding, the subrecipient is expected to provide to CDC, through DPH, copies of and/or access to COVID-19 data collected with these funds, including but not limited to data related to COVID-19 testing. CDC will specify in further guidance and directives what is encompassed by this requirement.
- 4. In addition to their local procurement rules/policies, the Local Health Department shall comply with the following rules, applying the most restrictive standard where there is a difference between any of the standards:

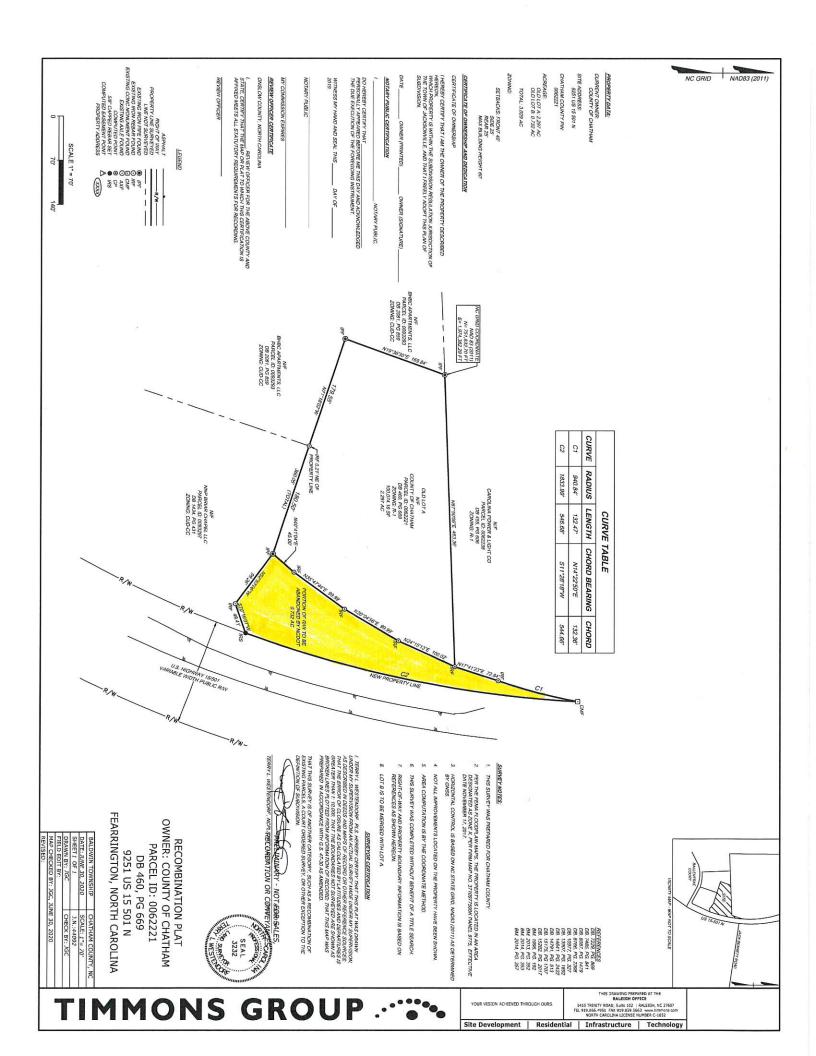

A legislative public hearing was held on June 15, 2020. Planning staff presented the rezoning request and the applicants Brent Pardum and George Venters were available for questions. No one signed up to speak. Planning staff have received comments for support of the rezoning.

The Planning Board met July 7, 2020 and discussed the request. Members were encouraged and supportive of new business coming to the Bonlee area and agreed this is appropriate in support of the Comprehensive Plan and located in the proper designation as shown on the Plan map. Specific discussions are noted below.

Discussion & Analysis:

The property is currently zoned R-1, Residential, the properties to the west are zoned IND-L Light Industrial, NB Neighborhood Business, and R-1 Residential. All other adjacent properties are zoned R-1, Residential but currently have businesses on them that chose not to rezone to a commercial designation at the time the BOC zoned the remainder of the county in 2016. They are permitted legal non-conforming businesses. The properties adjacent to the west is the "Bonlee Mall" area, which are mostly vacant, and an auto repair business. The property diagonal from the proposed rezoning is an auto business and to the south, there is a gas station and convenience store. When considering a general use zoning classification, the boards must consider all of the uses that are allowed within the district.

The following map shows the current zoning and the areas surrounding the parcel.

The property is in the Local Watershed district. There are no water features on the property and there is no special flood hazard area.

The following map shows the watershed classification.

In considering a general use rezoning request Section 19 of the Chatham County Zoning Ordinance includes four standards that must be addressed and supported in order for a rezoning application to be approved. The standards are:

Standard No 1: The alleged error in this Ordinance, if any, which would be remedied by the proposed amendment. No error in the ordinance is being alleged.

It is Planning Board and planning staff opinion this standard is met.

Standard No 2: The changed or changing conditions, if any, in the area or in the County generally, which

make the proposed amendment reasonably necessary to the promotion of the public health, safety, and general welfare. Historically, this property's use was a gas station and convenience store. All tanks have been removed and it has since gone into disrepair and is utilized for the land owner's personal storage. The applicant states this does not benefit the community and is also an eyesore. These properties are an excellent location and opportunity to help revitalize Bonlee and the Village Center core. It is Planning Board and planning staff opinion this standard is met.

Standard No 3: The manner in which the proposed amendment will carry out the intent and purpose of the adopted land use plan, or part thereof. In the Chatham County Comprehensive Plan adopted in 2017, Bonlee has been classified as a Village/Village Center which promotes development to "accommodate small-scale, local-serving retail, office, institutional, and service uses, restaurants, and some residential.

Mix of uses include retail, restaurant, services, and office uses clustered near a village center (typically consisting of smaller commercial footprints)" in mostly one- and two-story buildings. Economic Development Policy 2, Land Use Policy Strategy 2.3 and 6.1 support the development of village centers to encourage growth.

The proposed Neighborhood Business zoning will allow the redevelopment of a currently vacant corner parcel, which was historically was used for commercial purpose into new and more vibrant commercial uses that will serve the local residents of the Village Center.

The following map is the Future Land Use Plan Map. The properties are in the center of the Village Node. It is planning staff opinion this standard is met.

Standard No. 4: All other circumstances, factors, and reasons which the applicant offers in support of the proposed amendment. Currently, residents of Bonlee must travel almost 10 miles to access a variety of retail services. The Neighborhood Business rezoning will create flexibility, as suggested in the Chatham County Comprehensive Plan, allowing businesses to locate at this site to satisfy the convenience needs for the community. The proposed development would also offer employment opportunities, increased property and sales tax revenue for Chatham County.

The rezoning would pave the way to redevelop a prime corner which currently has two under- utilized buildings in disrepair that is not currently the highest and best use for the property. A new business coming to Bonlee could possibly re-energize the Village Center and bring further economic activity to the area. There are several older buildings across the street that are vacant but could be available for new businesses.

It is Planning Board and planning staff opinion this standard is met.

The Planning Board reviewed the item at their regularly scheduled meeting on July 7, 2020. Discussion points included the following:

1. Will the site be required to meet current stormwater requirements? The general assembly approved changes in 2018 stating: "when a preexisting development is redeveloped, increased stormwater controls shall only be required for the amount of impervious surface being created that exceeds the amount of impervious surface that existed before the redevelopment". The potential developer of the site has this option, and the current built upon area is approximately 0.23 acres (10,200 square feet) of the total 1.65 acres for the rezoning request.

2. Support among members for the request as it meets the Comprehensive Land Use Plan.

It is Planning Board and planning staff opinion that the Zoning Ordinance standards for granting a rezoning request have been met for this property.

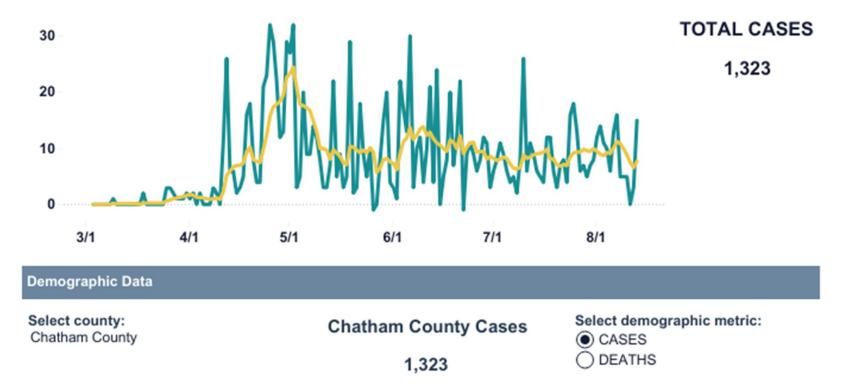
## COVID-19 Update

- Over 5 months since the initial case
- 1,323 confirmed cases and 55 deaths (as of 8/13/20)
- Around 7% of tests coming back positive in last week
- Statewide, 140,000+ confirmed cases and 2,300 deaths
- Community action key to reducing spread
  - Follow the 3 W's: Wear, Wash, Wait!
- Symptoms can be mild. Even if you think it is something else, treat it as if it is COVID-19

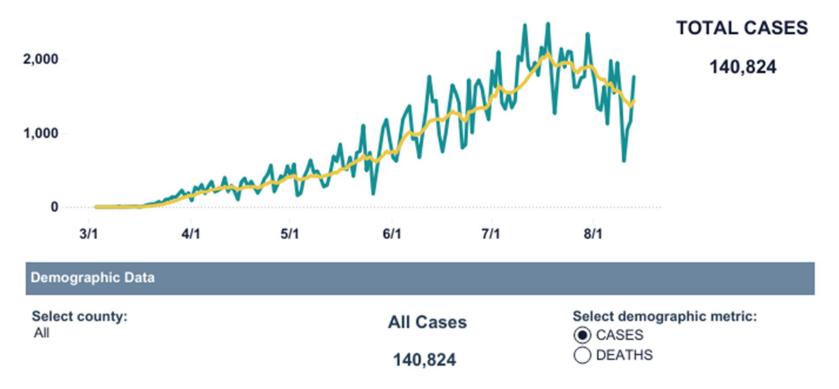

# COVID-19 Update: Public Health Response

- Weekly meetings with EM and local agencies, long-term care facilities, restaurants, and childcare centers
- Frequent consultation to businesses, Schools, organizations, and public, including through Info Line
- Responding to events daily and providing guidance to limit spread
- Community outreach and education: Latinx COVID Outreach Team, <u>www.chathamnc.org/coronavirus</u>
- Flyers, testing info, videos, media requests, business guide
- Donation drives, community resource hub through Chatham Health Alliance #ChathamTogether
- Over 100,000 cloth face coverings distributed
- Community Cohort COVID assessment
- Team effort!

# Internal Coronavirus Relief Fund Plan

- Public Health & Medical Expenses (\$175,000):
  - Purchase of sanitizer, masks, disinfectant and other cleaning materials for Departments
  - Bulk order of plexiglass and dividers for safety of employees and public for offices that have resumed services and those that will resume when safe to
- Payroll Expenses (\$1,285,221.12):
  - Judentified key staff salaries that will be covered by CRF
- Compliance (\$300,000):
  - Upfitting desktops to laptops for teleworking capabilities
  - Upfitting the Old Bank for safe tax and utility collections
- Exploring a couple of other projects to determine how we can best support the Chatham community

# External Coronavirus Relief Fund Use

- Nonprofits (\$200,000):
  - Launched Round 1 (reimbursement) of Nonprofit support through CRF which granted \$33,638.91 to 8 nonprofits serving Chatham County
  - Early September will launch Round 2 to commit funds for future programming or expenses
- Municipalities (25% = \$726,740):
  - Launched their orientation to the CRF
  - Currently waiting on their plans of use to be submitted (due September 1<sup>st</sup>)
- Economic Support (\$195,000):
  - Exploring options with EDC to support local businesses
- Exploring other ideas to support the greater Chatham community
