Chatham County Community Child Protection Team

What does the CCPT do?

- Review active child welfare cases to determine gaps or deficiencies in the community's resources that affect child wellbeing
- Examine policies and procedures of state and local agencies

Mandated CCPT Members

- The county director of social services and a member of the DSS staff;
- A local law enforcement officer, appointed by the board of county commissioners;
- An attorney from the district attorney's office, appointed by the district attorney;
- The executive director of the local community action agency, as defined by the Division of Economic Opportunity, Department Health and Human Services, or the executive director's designee;
- The superintendent of each local school administrative unit located in the county, or the superintendent's designee;
- A member of the county board of social services, appointed by the chair of that board;
- A local mental health professional, appointed by the director of the area authority established under Chapter 122C of the General Statutes;
- The local guardian ad litem coordinator, or the coordinator's designee;
- The director of the department of public health; and
- A local health care provider, appointed by the local board of public health.

Case Review Goals

Identifying gaps in service provision

Providing input and guidance for next steps

 Making recommendations for system change

Case Review Selection

- Selection based on complicated nature of the problems
- Social workers looking for feedback regarding improving outcomes
- All cases had significant CPS history; on average 6 investigations/assessments per family
- Most parents had at least one child ordered into DSS custody

Case Review Findings

- Multi-generational abuse and neglect (83%)
- Domestic violence identified in 83% of reviews
- Adult substance abuse in 83% of families
- Sexual abuse in 33% of families
- 67% of families had a child under age 5
- 67% of children had identified mental health diagnosis or developmental delay

FY 15 Recommendations

- Develop stronger child abuse and neglect prevention programs.
- Expand parenting programming for all parents.
- Maintain and enhance our current traumainformed child welfare system.
- Build a sustainable model of mental health treatment.
- Increase capacity to serve Spanish speaking families.

Progress During FY 16

- Two new parenting programs were implemented in Chatham County.
 Strengthening Families is for families with children aged 10-14 and Incredible Years Baby for children 0-8 months old.
- Trauma screening for all children involved in Child Protective Services and additional education programming for foster parents

Next Steps

- Support further implementation of new parenting programming
- Examine impacts of opioid abuse
- Considering continued subcommittee work based on priority areas
