





- In discussion with Paul Horne from Town of Pittsboro on the upcoming growth of facility and programming needs
- Recreation Advisory Committee held joint meeting with Pittsboro Parks and Recreation Advisory Committee
- Held annual retreat where Chris Blice, Chief Operations Officer from the school attended, this resulted in a joint site visit with him to Cumberland County to look at a shared use facility
- The Committee toured the Moncure Sprott Center to see the improvements as well as held a meeting at their location
- Held meeting with Town of Cary Staff and Recreation consultant to discuss Chatham Cary Joint Plan

- George Pauly and James Folgeman participated in the comp plan committee
- Submitted letter of support to the Recreational Trail Program Grant and was awarded the grant to improve the trail at the Lower Haw River and to construct a bridge over Pokeberry Creek (\$125,000 grant)



- Opportunities to attend conferences/trainings for committee members.


CCP&R Family Fun/ Movie Nights are a blast and bring the community together. Each year a themed night is hosted at each park to market to each side of the County
