COVID-19 Update


- Nearly 8 months since the initial case
- Number of confirmed cases and number of deaths as of 10/14
 - Chatham County 1,825 confirmed cases and 60 deaths (as of 10/14/20)
 - 52% of cases are among Hispanic/Latinx population
 - 80%+ deaths are among residents of nursing homes
 - North Carolina 236,407 confirmed cases and 3,856 deaths
- Percentage of tests coming back positive as of 10/14:
 - Chatham County 4.7%
 - North Carolina 6.6%
- Community action key to reducing spread
 - Follow the 3 W's: Wear, Wash, Wait!
- Symptoms can be mild.
 Even if you think it is something else, treat it as if it is COVID-19
- Pre-K through 2nd grade moving to Plan B today




Chatham Cases Over Time

COVID-19 Update: Public Health Response

- Increasing availability of testing (weekly testing events)
- Ongoing consultation with Chatham County Schools, congregate living facilities, workplaces, and many others
- Weekly meetings with EM and local agencies, long-term care facilities, restaurants, and childcare centers
- Responding to questions and concerns from the public, including via Info Line
- Sharing updates through media, website, social media (<u>www.chathamnc.org/coronavirus</u>)
- Planning for COVID19 Vaccination Clinics with community partners
- Communicable disease team response to cases
- Working to support those in isolation/quarantine
- Get your flu shot!
- Team effort





Internal Coronavirus Relief Fund Use

- Public Health & Medical Expenses (\$175,000):
 - Began setting up protective barriers (plexiglass) in offices
 - Purchasing items in conjunction with Emergency Management
 - Conducting additional check-ins with departments to ensure they have what they need to re-open when we decide it is safe to do so
- Payroll Expenses (\$1,285,221.12):
 - Identified key staff salaries that will be covered by CRF
- Compliance Expenses (\$300,000):
 - Completed the needs assessment for teleworking needs
 - Ordered teleworking needs requests
 - Purchasing Zoom and GoToMeeting packages to support virtual meetings
- Exploring other projects to determine how we can safely support the Chatham community

External Coronavirus Relief Fund Use

- Nonprofits (\$200,000):
 - Finished Round 1 and Round 2 of the Nonprofit Application Processes
 - Supported 20 Chatham County nonprofits through this process
 - Nonprofits have begun submitting their reports to the County on expenses through March 1 – September 2020
- Municipalities (\$726,740):
 - All municipalities have received their allocations
 - They are currently submitting reports to the County on expenses through March 1 – September 2020
- Economic Support (\$195,000):
 - Exploring options with EDC
 - Launched housing support programs through DSS for individuals impacted by COVID-19, which includes utility support and mortgage support
- Exploring other ideas to support the greater Chatham community

Chatham County Develops COVID-19 Guidance for Businesses

- To assist businesses as they plan to reopen and operate during the COVID-19 pandemic, Chatham County has created Reopening Your Business: A Guide for Safely Opening and Operating Your Business. The guide can be found at the Chatham County Coronavirus web page, under Employer FAQs.
- It includes recommendations specific to business type from nail salons and restaurants to dentist offices and childcare facilities.
- Several Chatham County agencies developed the guide based on guidance from the CDC and North Carolina Department of Health and Human Services.
